OFFICES ARE FILLED

Sons of American Revolution
 Hold Election.

MORE PATRIOTISM URGED

Membership of 204 Hears Reports
 of Flourishing Condition—Of-
 ficials Retained Except
 Four New Managers.

Ending the most successful year in
 its history, the Oregon Society, Sons
 of the American Revolution, held its
 annual meeting yesterday afternoon at
 the University Club. Reports were
 heard and officers elected for the com-
 ing year. Last night the annual
 year, which included addresses of a pa-
 triotic nature, was held at the Univer-
 sity Club.

Regret was expressed yesterday at
 the business meeting that the birth-
 day of Washington was not more gen-
 erally observed in Portland than was
 the case yesterday, and efforts will
 be made in the future to rouse a more
 patriotic interest in the occasion. This
 was made the subject of a resolution
 which was as follows:

Resolution Is Adopted. Sons
 of the American Revolution, notices
 with regret that Washington's birth-
 day is not celebrated extensively in
 Portland this year, be it resolved:
 "First, that in our estimation Feb-
 ruary 22 is the most important of our
 patriotic days next to July 4, and,
 "Second, that the board of man-
 agers be requested to take such action
 as shall secure more universal ob-
 servance of February 22 for the pur-
 pose of stimulating patriotism among
 our citizens both new and old."

A resolution was also adopted to
 the effect that the Americanization
 committee be continued in office and
 that the scope of its work be enlarged
 so that it shall apply itself to the pa-
 triotic instruction of school children
 and aliens particularly. This com-
 mittee consists of General Charles F.
 Beebe, Robert Treat Platt and J. Har-
 old Miller.

Officers Are Re-elected.
 The choice of officers for the coming
 year resulted in the re-election of all
 officers with the exception of the ad-
 dition of four new members to the board
 of managers, as follows: H. H. Ward,
 J. P. Wing, B. E. Sanford and W. J.

 Reports received from officers of
 the organization showed it to be in a
 most flourishing condition. Member-
 ship numbers 204 at the close of the

Book Appropriation Made.
 A report of the demand for books
 of a patriotic nature, which has large-
 ly been filled in the past by libraries
 donated by the society, was received
 from Miss Cornelia Marvin, state li-
 brarian, who expressed the wish that a
 further appropriation might be made
 for this purpose by the society. The
 sum of \$100 was voted for this work.
 It was also voted to refer the mat-
 ter of appropriation for prize essays
 among school children of the state to
 the board of managers. This money
 will be awarded for the best articles
 on patriotic subjects to be assigned
 later.

"Let us stand together for a greater

 tenants whenever required. Mr. Car-

 movement on Grand avenue is encour-
 aging.
