

SALEM RACES SET

State Fair Programme Offers Exceptional Interest.

PURSES TO TOTAL \$16,500

Future Events Eliminated and 9 Running Races Put on Card. 2:12 Trot and 2:08 Pace to Be for \$2000 Each.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 23.—(Special).—The programme of races for the Oregon State Fair this year was completed today at a meeting here of the speed committee appointed by the State Fair Board. The six-day speed schedule this year, it is declared, will be of greater interest to the crowds in general than in the past, as the committee has included nine running races. The Futurity events are eliminated, as these classes of events, the committee decided, were of interest mostly to the racing fraternity and breeders.

The purses offered this year will reach a total of \$16,500, the committee announced. The racing card will be Wednesday and Thursday, Salem and Portland day, respectively. The chief attraction offered for Salem day will be the 2:08 pace for a purse of \$1000. The big end of the money goes to the winner of three out of five heats.

ANGLERS WILL GATHER

MANY PRIZES TO BE GIVEN FOR LANDING BIG SALMON. Meeting Tomorrow to Be Featured by Reports on Fishing Condition of Various Streams.

Important subjects are to be discussed at the regular meeting of the Multnomah Anglers Club tomorrow night at the Commercial Club. H. J. Kelly, formerly Master Fish Warden of Oregon, will relate the history of the steelhead trout. Ray Winters will give a report on the number of prizes the Salmon Club will give out and how they will be distributed.

Gold buttons are given to any member catching a Chinook salmon weighing 40 pounds or over; silver buttons for salmon weighing between 30 and 40 pounds and bronze buttons for one weighing between 20 and 30 pounds. The fish must be caught with a six-ounce rod and a nine-strand line.

W. F. Backus will report on the condition of the mouth of the Sandy River. The subject of Oregon City net men fishing above the bridge will be discussed. Salmon fishing at Oregon City will start in earnest about March 20. There is any number of fish there at present, however, and many of the rabid anglers will be out just as soon as the water goes down a few inches and becomes clearer.
