CHAMBER MAN EXPECTED SOON.—

AFRICAN CHURCH DAMAGES FIXED.—
 In the condemnation suit of the city
 of Portland against the trustees of the

 already been laid, a jury in the
 Circuit Judge McGinn yesterday
 granted the church \$729.93 as equiva-
 lent damages.
