WASHINGTON, March 3 .- By a vote of 68 to 14 the Senate today carried out President Wilson's wish and killed Senator Gore's resolution to warn Americans off armed belligerent ships.

In a turbulent scene, such as is seldom witnessed in the Senate, voting proceeded, with Senators shouting obtion to explain their positions and making hot retorts to each other, all of which were out of order.

At one time so many Senators were shouting for the Vice-President's recognition that the sergeant-at-arms was called to restore quiet.

Discussion Follows Vote

After having maneuvered for two days to get the resolution in such parliamentary position that it was disposed of without debate, the Senate then proceeded to a general discussion of the subject, which continued all afternoon, to the dismay of Administration supporters. There were free expressions of opinion that the Sen-Gore resolution, with a correction by the author and a substitute by Senator McCumber, was in effect a "Scotch verdict," and had not actually accomplished the purpose of the President.
