Under the Oregon constitution, no person holding a lucrative office or appointment under the United States or state, is eligible to hold another lucrative office at the same time.

I. H. Van Winkle, first assistant Attorney-General, said today that, without having looked into the matter carefully, he believed Mr. Wells would have to resign as insurance commis-


carefully, he believed Mr. Wells would have to resign as insurance commissioner before he could qualify as Presidential elector.

COMMISSIONER OF CORPORATIONS FILES REPORT.

Mr. Schulderman Shows Receipts of 87400 Over Last Year and Expenses of \$3700 Less.

SALEM, Or., April 10. - (Special.) -With a decrease in expenses of the department amounting to \$3737.39, and an increase in receipts totaling \$7364.38 for the nine months of the current fiscal year ending March 31, as compared with the corresponding period of the preceding year, an exceptional

the preceding year, an exceptional showing from the standpoint of economy is made by Corporation Commissioner Schulderman. Mr. Schulderman filed a comparative report of the work of his office with Governor Withycombe today.

The report shows that the gross receipts of the corporation department for July, 1913, to March, 1916, inclusive, were \$116,363.29, while for the corresponding period of the year before the receipts totaled \$108,938.82.

"This increase," Commissioner Schulderman advises the Governor, "is in spite of the fact that the collection of annual fees from banks was transferred.
