

ALL CITY HARKENS TO CLEAN-UP CALL

Campaign Plans Expected to Be Completed at Meeting at Chamber Tonight.

MAY 1-15 ARE DATES SET

Civic Organizations and Schools Name Delegates to Gathering. Co-operation of Boy Scouts of Fire Department Given.

The entire city is becoming aroused to the importance of the meeting to-night in connection with the "clean-up and paint-up" movement.

The meeting of delegates from civic organizations will be held on the fifth floor of the Chamber of Commerce in the Oregon building. Mayor Albee and all the City Commissioners will speak. It is expected that complete plans will be outlined tonight for cleaning the city between May 1 and May 15. The beginning will be made on "washday" and will end on "washday." Two Saturdays will intervene, giving plenty of time for the activity of boys and girls in the schools. The Boy Scouts are gathering information as to spots in the city that require attention.

Co-operation of City Needed. Mrs. R. D. Inman and a committee of women who have long been interested in the foreign quarters of the city probably will outline a scheme for interesting those citizens.

The co-operation of the city will be necessary in the removal of the piles of debris that will be gathered in portions of the city where garbage service is not available. It is declared by the street-cleaning department that only sufficient funds are available at this time to carry on the daily routine work of that department.

The co-operation of the city fire department is pledged by Fire Marshal Stevens. He will cause an inspection to be made of every building in the city during the 15 days' campaign.

500 Wanted at Meeting Tonight.

Tonight, however, it is hoped that at least 500 citizens will attend the first big meeting and will be willing to participate in the organization of committees to carry on the work.

\$1642 SUIT IS THROWN OUT

Foreclosure on Store of Defendant Sufficient, Rules Judge.

As no consideration was recited in the guarantee R. B. Knight gave Balfour, Guthrie & Co. for his son, C. E. Knight, to the amount of \$2500, Circuit Judge Gantenbein held yesterday that the plaintiff in the suit of Balfour, Guthrie & Co. against Knight did not have legal cause for action and granted the defendant a non-suit.

The defense contended that as the plaintiff in the case had foreclosed on the feed store conducted by the son at 328 North Seventeenth street on March 2, 1914, there was no more consideration due. The suit was for \$1642.
