Mohair Season Ends With Market at 51 1/2-2 Cents. The 1916 mohair season in Oregon came to a close yesterday in a blaze of glory...

EDDYVILLE SALE IS TOP

Final Pool of 1916 Series is Bought by Theodore Bernheim & Co., of This City—Best Previous Price Exceeded by 9 Cents.

The 1916 mohair season in Oregon came to a close yesterday in a blaze of glory for the growers. The last of the large sales was held at Eddyville and the history of the Oregon trade was paid.

The pool brought 51 1/2 cents a pound, and the buyer was Theodore Bernheim & Co., of Portland. There was about 17,000 pounds of mohair in the pool.

The market this year has reached a point about 15 cents higher than the top price of last year and 23 cents higher than two years ago.

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The big advance in mohair prices this year is due to several reasons, chief of which is the high price of wool.

RECEIPTS ARE NOT LARGE

There was a very good run of hogs at the stockyards yesterday, but a lighter supply of cattle than usual at the opening of the week.

There was no change in the egg situation. Saturday's prices were repeated and the market was firm.

Poultry receipts were moderate and prices were unchallenged. Dressed meats were not as steady as last week.
