Strawberry Short Cake

For dinner every Sunday and once or twice on week days is not too often to serve this delicious dessert as long as straw-berries last. The whipped cream for the top is not absolutely necessary, but it makes a short cake more attractive to the eye as well as to the taste.

K C Strawberry Short Cake

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.






