Fee, for University, Breaks Northwest Record With 12 Feet 4 in Pole Vault.

MUIRHEAD ALSO SCORES 17

Oscar Gorezsky, Star Portland High School Sprinter of Three Years Ago, Does "Come Back" and Wins Century Event.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 12.—(Special).—By a narrow margin of 11 points Oregon defeated Oregon Agricultural College this afternoon in their annual football meet.

One Northwest and one college record went by the boards, both broken by Chester Fee, of the lemon-yellow, and holder of the title of third place, best all-around athlete of the United States.

Later in the meet he heaved the javelin out 173 feet 6 inches, smashing the college javelin record held by "Bill" Sell at 169 feet.

Fee and Muirhead set a high-point winners today with 17 points each.

Crowd of 1000 Attends. A crowd of more than 1000, attracted by the "come back" of Chester Fee, the grandstand and bleachers, Kincaid oval was in perfect condition, and a slight breeze kept the afternoon from being oppressively warm.

The meet was the most closely contested between the two institutions in the 12 years "Bill" Hayward has been coach. From the start with the mile to the close of the relay, every inch of ground was contested, and the crowd was brought to its feet time after time.

Oscar Gorezsky, star Portland high school sprinter of three years ago, staged a "come back" in the century dash. After two years of endeavor under varsity colors he romped away from the field with a time of 1:59.4.

He was noted out in the 220 by Peacock, another athlete formerly in Portland circles.

Coleman High Man for Aggies. Coleman, Never in recent years has a runner been seen on the local field with Coleman's endurance. He finished first in the mile, took second in the two mile, second in the half mile, and was a member of the winning relay team.

KENTUCKY DERBY RICH

RACE TODAY AT LOUISVILLE IS WORTH \$15,000.

Macomber Entry, Star Hawk, and the Cook, May Be Honored as Post Favorite in Betting.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 12.—"The most open race in the history of the stake," horsemen declared tonight in reference to the 42d annual renewal of the Kentucky derby, to be run at Churchill Downs, Tenn. tomorrow at 4 o'clock.

Fifty-six nominations, including virtually every American 2-year-old which attained distinction last year, were made for the derby. Seven geldings and three fillies were named as possible starters, but the field now has narrowed to the best colts named.

Macomber entry, Star Hawk and the Cook, may be honored as post favorite in betting.

Special trains have poured a throng of people into Louisville for the derby, and visitors are here from Chicago, New York, Cincinnati, San Francisco and other cities.

Governor A. O. Stanley will witness the race from the judges' stand and then decorate the winning jockey and his mount with wreaths of roses.

The derby record is 2:03 2-5, and made by a gelding, Old Rosebud, when he won the classic in 1914.
