Shipments in Transit and Receipts 400,000 Pounds.

More Wool Will Be Brought to Portland for Sale This Year Than Ever Before-Benefits of Consolidation.

There wool will be handled in Portland this season than ever before, in spite of the strong prices being paid in the coun-try, according to present indications. With the stock now in storage and the shipments in transit, the Portland Wool Ware-

ments in transit the Forthand Wood Wars-house Company will have 400,000 pounds on hand by the close of next week.

With wood prices climbing in all parts of the country and Eastern authorities needecing still higher values, Oregon growers this season show a disposition to hold their clims and await developments. Their builtish enthusiasm is naturally increased by the efforts buyers are making east of the mountains to set possession of choice

by the efforts buyers are making east of the mountains to get possession of choice wool. A spirit of speculation has taken hold of growers in many sections of the centry and they believe their chances of profiling by not solling early were never better than this year.

In the Williamstte Valley, where country merchanis and other buyers have been offering prices on a rising scale, they have found the farmers unusually slow sellers. The tendency in the Valley this year is to get the wool together in larger quantities, either to pools or in consolidated lots, as either to peols or in consolidated lots, as this method is more attractive to buyers and note better results to the sollers. Projects of this sort are new under way in Yambili, Linn, Lane and Douglas coun-

thes.

This consolidating of neighborhood clips is in line with the policy of the Portland Weel Warehouse Company, which seeks to make Portland the central market for weel produced in the Northwest and to bring Pastern buyers here. There are 1105 manufacturing concerns using weel in the United States, and up to this time only a half dozen or so have come West to get their weel. If a large part of the North Paulite clip can be gathered here for asle it will attract a larger number of Eastern buyers and the growers will get the benefit of the Increased competition.

### HIGH WOOL PRICES AT ALL POINTS Buyers Are Paying More for Choice Clips In West.

Good prices are being paid by wool buyers in all parts of the West. One of the active sections is around Rawlins, Wyo., on the line of the Union Pacific, where one clip of 200,000 to 400,000 pounds has been obtained by a Boston house at 31% ceurs and other business is noted at 30 to 31% cents for medium clips. Some interest is noticeable in Central Utah, on the basis of 24 to 25 cents for fine clips. Eastern houses are get cents for this clips. Lasters houses are get-ting medium wools on the Utah-Colgrado horder at 32 to 35 cents, but these high rates are not significant, as the wools are so much lighter than other sections offer. LEAD MOVEMENT RAILS

NEW YORK, May 12.—With few noteworthy exceptions atocks of almost all descriptions moved to higher levels in today's broad market. Dealings embraced far more than the usual number-of issues and gains extended from 1 to more than 6 points in standard sharps, being trebled or quasi-rupled in some of the highly speculative specialities.

The movement derived much of its impulse from an early rise in rulls, Canadian Pacific leading that division with an entreme gain of 7½ points on very large trading. New Haven was next in point of strength, gaining 4 points largely at the expense of a short interest, while other Lastern lines, as well as coalers and fouthern instead in proved it to I points. Further activity in Big Pour common and preferred, which advanced 5 and 2 points.
