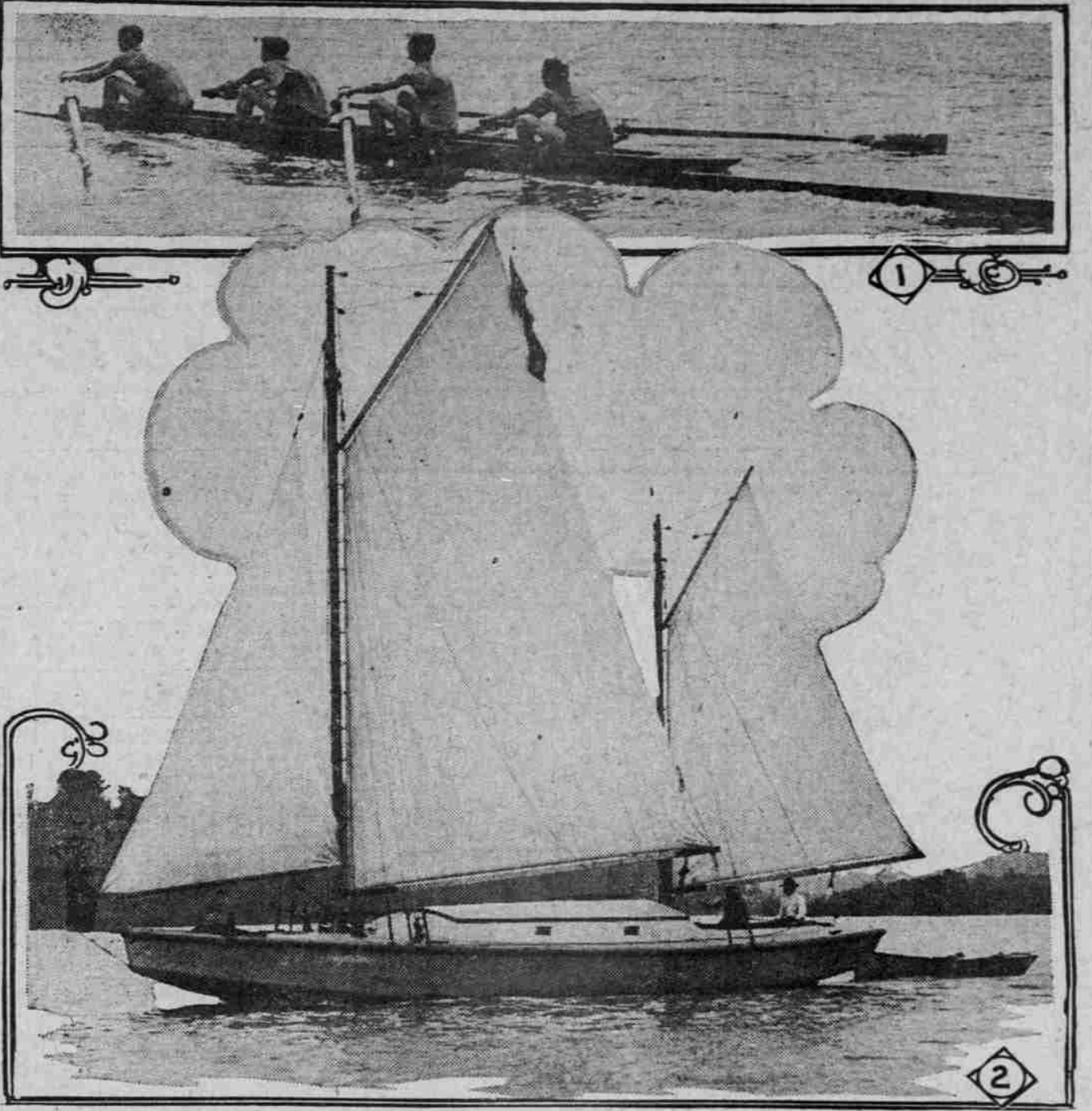
YOUTH BEATS VETERAN OLIN LEWIS PUTS S. B. COOKE OUT OF TOURNAMENT RACING.
