

BANKERS TO RAISE \$10,000 FOR SHOW Assistance Is Given Livestock Industry by Donation to Portland Exhibit.

BRANCH BANKS OPPOSED Oregon Delegation Is Called On to Nullify Federation Reserve Order for New Clearing System for Out-of-Town Items.

Encouragement to the livestock industry was given yesterday by the bankers of the state, in annual convention, when they voted to raise \$10,000 to be used in helping defray the expenses of the Pacific International Livestock Show, to be held in Portland next winter.

Resolutions adopted by the convention at its closing session yesterday opposed the passage of an act by Congress that permits National banks of \$1,000,000 or more to have capital stock to operate branch banks.

Another resolution was in favor of modifying the state law regulating trust companies so that greater protection may be given. The convention also went on record by resolution favoring the opening of the Klammath Indian Reservation to white settlers.

Clearing System Opposed. A declaration against the proposed check-clearing system for out-of-town items, made effective July 15 by the Federal Reserve Bank, carried by rather a wide margin.

The resolution not only opposed it, but asked the Oregon delegation in Congress to nullify the new order. As forecast yesterday, Marshfield was chosen as the place for holding the next annual convention, which will take place next summer.

Fred L. Meyers, of La Grande, was elected president for the coming year and E. D. Cusick, of Albany, vice-president. J. H. Booth, of Roseburg, was chosen treasurer and John L. Hartman, long secretary of the state body of bankers, was re-elected to that office.

The following were chosen as members of the executive committee: E. G. Crawford, Portland; J. W. Bennett, Marshfield; W. O. Smith, Astoria; J. R. Blackaby, Ontario; and E. O. Blanchard, Hood River.

Officers for Oregon to serve in connection with the American Bankers Association were elected as follows: J. M. Poorman, Woodburn, vice-president for Oregon; R. W. Schmeier, Portland, to serve on nominating committee; A. L. Tucker, Portland, alternate; W. L. Thompson, Pendleton, vice-president for National bank section for Oregon; William Pailman, Baker, vice-president for trust company section for Oregon.

Road Bond Issues Not Indorsed. A motion to raise money by means of bond issues for the construction of roads throughout the state was laid on the table by the bankers after some discussion. The plan was presented by J. H. Albert, of Salem, and Leslie Butler, of Hood River, members of the State Highway Commission's advisory board. These two men and Carter spoke in favor of the motion, while John A. Thornburgh, E. D. Cusick, W. F. Elmore, W. Thompson, F. L. Myers and Sam M. Garland presented arguments against it.

Charles E. Cochran, assistant general attorney for the O. W. R. & N. company, who was on the programme for a paper on "Oregon's Part in the National Thrift Campaign," to be read Tuesday, was out of the city, and as he did not return yesterday, printed copies of the address were supplied to the delegates.

Waste Placed in Billions. Mr. Cochran's estimates of annual waste in the United States which could, he said, be prevented amounted to \$7,500,000,000.

Business of the convention was completed yesterday in time for the bankers and their wives to attend the baseball game. Last night's dinner at the Portland ended the convention. The vacant 75 by 100 feet on the southwest corner of Thirteenth and Irving streets was sold yesterday by Max Loewson and George Loewson to the Oregon Security Company, of Portland, at a reported valuation of \$32,500.

As approximately \$20,000 of the payment the Loewson brothers accepted title to land 100 by 200 feet in area on the northeast corner of Twenty-sixth and Sawyer streets and an acre of land in Mount Tabor Heights. The deal was handled by J. G. Gustaff.
