

## AUSTRIAN "HERO" IS PERSISTENT WOODR

Otto Neufeldt Held for Threatening Life of Mrs. Treadway.

## PRISONER DENIES CHARGE

At Hearing in Municipal Court, Witnesses Testify Self-Styled Lieutenant Had Cast Hypnotic Spell Over Women.

Arthur Swartzenberger, alias Otto Neufeldt, self-styled lieutenant of the Austrian army and escaped Siberian prisoner, apparently suffered a lapse of memory in Municipal Judge Langguth's court yesterday, where he was given a hearing on the charge of having threatened the life of Mrs. E. S. Treadway, head of the Apostolic Faith Mission in Portland and at Tacoma.

At the conclusion of the hearing Judge Langguth ordered that Swartzenberger be required to furnish a bond of \$500 to keep the peace, or in default of bond, remain in the County Jail until the next session of the Circuit Court.

In February last Swartzenberger appeared at the Tacoma mission, the Apostolic Faith witnesses testified, and was befriended by those in charge. He told them that he was an escaped Siberian prisoner, who had witnessed active service as an officer in the Austrian army. Later he repaid their trust by forcing his way into the home of Miss Martha Strate, a member of the mission and attained an uncanny ascendancy over the young woman's affections, they alleged. She fled to her home at Rex, Ore., to escape him, but the pseudo officer followed. He blamed Mrs. Treadway for foiling his designs, the witnesses testified, and threatened her life.

## Witness Recalls Threat.

William Hornshuh, 1143 East Tenth street, was called to the witness stand. He testified that his sister, Mrs. Hornshuh, had been expelled from the Apostolic Mission at Tacoma, for permitting Swartzenberger to visit Miss Strate at her home. On May 25, he said, the defendant appeared at his home in this city, stating that he "would like to see Frau Hornshuh and explain the trouble at Tacoma." It was at this interview, the witness said, that he made the threat against Mrs. Treadway's life.

The comely young woman in the case, Miss Martha Strate, was next called. She blushed with embarrassment, but gave her testimony with convincing directness. Miss Strate testified that she met Swartzenberger about April 1 in Tacoma. He told her that he had escaped from the British in Canada, by the assistance of an English officer's daughter, who stole her father's pistol and gave it to him. Later, he told Miss Strate, the officer's daughter was to join him in this country.

John Kossuth, member of the Apostolic Mission, of Tacoma, testified that Swartzenberger was his guest for three weeks in that city. He stated that he had been told the story of the British officer's daughter and the escape from Canada. The affection of the defendant for Miss Strate was reviewed by the witness, who added that when Mrs. Treadway visited Tacoma she put an end to his attentions.

## Testimony Is Corroborated.

The testimony of Mrs. Treadway, for the alleged threatening of whose life the arrest was made, closely corroborated that of previous witnesses. She stated that she discovered Swartzenberger's malicious activities among the young women of the Tacoma Mission, particularly with reference to Miss Strate, when she visited that city.

Mrs. Strate, mother of Martha, was the next witness. She was asked if she recognized the defendant as the man who had visited her daughter at Rex. She replied affirmatively. Mrs. Strate spoke German to the defendant and Judge Langguth joined in the discussion.

## "Officer" Was Hypnotic.

That the defendant possessed a hypnotic influence over Martha, an influence which he also practiced on a younger daughter of the family, Mrs. Strate was certain. She said that both girls had told her that in his presence they were helpless and grew faint.

Deputy District Attorney Deich severely condemned Swartzenberger, whom he characterized as being more willing to "face petticoats than bullets."

In rendering judgment, Judge Langguth expressed the belief that Swartzenberger had undoubtedly displayed evil intent and that he had exercised a peculiar power of hypnotic fascination to weaken the resistance of Miss Strate, who, normally, did not care for him and was afraid of his advances.

## WOMAN IS FOUND SUICIDE

Body of Mrs. Winifred Cahill Is Discovered in Brushy Gulch.

The body of Mrs. Winifred Cahill, 52, was found yesterday afternoon in a brushy gulch near East Forty-third and Powell streets. By the dead woman's side was a bottle that had contained carbolic acid, indicating that she had committed suicide. Her disappearance early in the day had caused a search to be made for her, and the discovery was made by her nephew, George McDonald.

Mrs. Cahill, whose home was at 428 East Washington street, had been employed for some weeks as a nurse at the home of Edward Magee, near Forty-third and Powell streets, whose mother is ill. Yesterday morning she left the house and failed to return.

## PROPERTY OWNER MISSING

Relation of Frank Shinabarger Wants to Pay Up Taxes.

Frank Shinabarger and his wife have dropped mysteriously from sight, leaving considerable property in Portland, according to a letter received by City Treasurer Adams from Dr. L. M. Nussbaum, of Storm Lake, a relation of Mr. Shinabarger's.

Dr. Nussbaum writes that he has sought for years to get trace of his relations, but always without success. Property owned by them in Talston's addition has become delinquent in taxes and assessments for about three years past. Dr. Nussbaum writes that he wishes to pay off the indebtedness.
