

POWER COMPANY SYSTEM CHANGED

Concern Operating in Willamette Valley Made Into Districts and Divisions.

A. NORMAN IS MANAGER

Corporation to Be Operating Separately From Parent Concern and Officials Are Moved Into Different Territory.

EUGENE, Or., June 12.—(Special).—A general reorganization of the operation of the Oregon Power Company, a subsidiary of the Northern Idaho & Montana Power Company, was announced today by A. Norman, vice-president and general manager of the Oregon Power Company.

By this reorganization, the local managers in the many towns served by the company's properties are superseded by division superintendents and district managers. The operation of the Oregon Power Company, which is under the direct supervision of Mr. Norman, is handled through the Coos and Willamette divisions. The Willamette division is divided into the Eugene, Albany, Junction City, Corvallis and Dallas districts; the Eugene district covering Tangent, Shedd and Brownsville; Junction City including Harrisburg and Halsey; Corvallis including Philomath, and Dallas covering Monmouth and Independence.

The company has electric service in all these towns except Eugene; has gas service in Eugene and Springfield, and water service in Springfield, Albany and Independence.

The Coos Bay division is composed of the Marshfield and Coquille districts. In the Marshfield district the company serves Marshfield and North Bend with gas and electricity; Myrtle Point and Coquille with electricity only.

In connection with this change in form of management, Elmer Dyer, of Tacoma, who has been president of both the Oregon Power Company and the Northern Idaho & Montana Power Company, retires as president of the Oregon Power Company, and leaves the active management of the other company to James A. Green, who also becomes the president of the Oregon Power Company, but with Mr. Norman as the active executive manager.

Mr. Green has been the general manager of the Northern Idaho & Montana Power Company. F. J. Martin, general auditor of the Northern Idaho & Montana Power Company, will be stationed at Springfield, where A. L. Ingalls, auditor of the Oregon Power Company, is also stationed.

J. L. White, of Albany, becomes superintendent of the Willamette division. A. L. Martin, of Dallas, takes the Coos Bay division.

R. U. Steelquist, of Corvallis, will have charge of the Dallas district.

COLLEGE YEAR CLOSES

ALBANY SCHOOL OBSERVES 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF ITS BIRTH.

Commencement Exercises to Be Concluded Wednesday With Address by Dr. Luther Dyott.

ALBANY, Or., June 12.—(Special).—Yesterday marked the 50th anniversary of the opening of Albany College and the Albany Presbyterian Church. The event was celebrated last night by a union service with all the churches of the city joining and listening to an address by Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette University, on "Christian Education."

College commencement week also was opened yesterday with the baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class and the farewell address to the Christian associations. Rev. Harry Leeds, of Portland, preached the farewell sermon before the Christian associations and President Wallace Howe Lee the baccalaureate sermon.

The senior class day exercises were held today, closing with the class play, Shakespeare's "As You Like It."

Tuesday morning the annual meeting of the board of trustees will be held. In the afternoon President Lee and Mrs. Lee will give the annual reception to the board of trustees, after which the annual reunion and dinner will be held at St. Francis Hotel.

Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock the commencement proper will take place. Dr. Luther Dyott, of the first Congregational Church of Portland, will deliver the address.

ROAD BOND IS PROPOSED

Wasco to Vote on \$300,000 Issue at November Election.

THE DALLES, Or., June 12.—(Special).—Petitions are out for a road

bond issue in Wasco County and will probably be voted on in the November election. The petitions provide for the expenditure of \$300,000 to be used in the building of the Columbia River Highway from the Hood River County line to point several miles east of The Dalles, and the improvement of the Dalles-California Highway from The Dalles to the Jefferson County line.

Local good roads enthusiasts are working to make The Dalles the hub of good roads in Central Oregon and a division point for tourist travel.

With the completion of the Columbia River Highway motorists may leave that road at The Dalles for Goldendale and the Yakima Valley in Washington; for California by Klamath Falls and Crater Lake; for Boise and Salt Lake

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FRIENDS DECRY WAR

Church in Session at Newberg Adopts Resolutions.

LIQUOR IMPORTS OPPOSED

Loyalty Is Pledged to Country, but Love of All Mankind Is Put Above Everything Else—Bible School Work Discussed.

NEWBERG, Or., June 12.—(Special).—The 24th annual session of Oregon yearly meeting of the Friends Church, which will close tomorrow at noon, has been marked by the unanimous and hearty endorsement of the movement to initiate an addition to the prohibitory amendment to the constitution of Oregon forbidding the importation as well as the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages, and strong resolutions against all war. A protest was made against the introduction of military drill in public schools, whether voluntary or compulsory; the requirement of military drill on the part of all male students of some of the state educational institutions of the Northwest was denounced as tyrannical, since it demands that taxpayers violate their conscience in this matter if they hold to Friends' views of war and war preparation.

The authorities of the Nation were urged to seek for the peace of the world and of the United States, "not by armed force, but by the power of truth and love and justice." The following resolutions were adopted: "Resolved, That we pledge our love and loyalty to our country, and desire always to be willing to make any rightful sacrifice in the interests of genuine patriotism; but that we cannot permit a false idea of patriotism to blind us to the fact that we owe our love to all mankind and must not permit it to be circumscribed by geographical boundaries; and that we must place our loyalty to Jesus Christ above our loyalty to any man or set of men, being true to our conscientious convictions at whatever cost."

The Bible school and missionary interests were discussed today under the leadership of Dr. Nelson Morrison, of Portland, and C. J. Sherman, of Portland. The work in both of these departments has flourished during the year.

Voluntary gifts have been made from time to time to the Christian Endeavor work, Pacific College for the installation of the equipment of the commercial department for next year, and to the work of the meetings at Turner and Sherwood and to the general work of evangelization and church extension.

Meeting appropriations will be made tomorrow.

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
