Gorgeous Blooms on Display at Clubhouse Attract Many Visitors.

EXHIBIT IS DEMOCRATIC

Flowers Now Are Loveliest Because of Late Season—Show Is Open to Public—All Fine Gardens Are Represented.

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be strengthened and an ample reserve of trained men must be prepared. There was much speculation on all sides tonight as to the probable course of the President should Carranza order an attack on General Pershing's men in the face of the American Government's solemn warning that it was generally believed that the hint contained in Secretary Lansing's note that military occupation of Northern Mexico had been considered as an alternative at times when the situation beyond the border appeared critical might indicate the plan of action would now be forced upon the Nation.

As a preliminary step to such an occupation the United States would require an army of the size such an undertaking would require, it was regarded as possible that a general advance from the border line might be undertaken. With American forces disposed along such a line, the transportation of supplies and strategic points from the Pacific to the Gulf Coast, there could be no fear of Carranza's men cutting off the line of General Pershing and his men. The exact disposition of the troops, even the exact number now beyond the border could not be ascertained. It is a reason to believe, however, that between 10,000 and 12,000 Regulars are posted in the border zone.

It is pointed out that establishment of a general line across Mexico west of Pulpit Pass would close that route to hostile forces. Another argument advanced in support of the plan of action was that the various railroads could be quickly repaired and made use of to supply the troops, making it possible to move the scene of hostilities on Mexican soil.

Army officers and high officials would not discuss these suggestions. They admitted privately their belief that war was imminent, since Carranza had given every indication of a determination to force an issue at any cost, but were disposed to refrain from making any remarks that might serve to inflame the minds of the Mexican people.

For the same reason, the proposed resolution to put into immediate effect the National Prohibition Act, which would prohibit the sale of liquor in Congress. The action of the bill referred to contains the statement that the men that are called "regulars" are "for the duration of the war" unless sooner discharged. Because of this phraseology of the bill, because adoption of the resolution would be only a matter of a few minutes when needed, leaders in Congress determined to hold it up until events show it is to be expected beyond the border.

Ambassador designate Arredondo had arranged to see Secretary Lansing today but withdrew after an appointment after the note had been handed to him. He made no explanation either of the subject of his projected call or his reason for canceling it. It is believed, however, that he was anxious to learn the attitude of General Carranza regarding the armistice note before having any further formal interchanges with American officials.

Fuller's Allister Stella Gray in a huge basket is much admired. E. E. Goudy is exhibiting red roses. Mrs. W. D. Johnson is exhibiting in roses, Mrs. Jay Smith is a generous contributor of varieties and Mrs. A. D. Charlton has on view "white male" roses filled with pink, white and red roses. Bishop Sumner has contributed a vase filled with beautiful red and yellow roses.

Mrs. James F. Ewing has an attractive collection of red and white roses in vases, with a decorative note added in her tall blue vase of delphiniums and valencia in two colors. Mrs. Fred Prescott Kendall and Mrs. Geneva W. Lilly have tables of lovely specimen blooms.

Mrs. John A. Keating's table of Hugh Dicksons is especially lovely. Blaise Labbe has a very unusual exhibit of giant black lilies of Africa, three of the huge beautiful flowers created a table top.

From the gardens of H. E. Weed have come lovely peonies and these make an additional note of color and artistic worth in the exhibition.

Today is the last day of the display and everyone is urged to attend. Take a Portland Heights car, get off at the street and wait one block to the right to the clubhouse.

War Department officials have been highly gratified at reports of crowded recruiting stations in several states. They also are pleased that the errors of virtually all states having important National Guard units which were not summoned have sought permission to forward their entire contingents.

No increases in the allotments made are now contemplated. In this connection it was learned that the selections made were designed to furnish the elements of several provisional brigades and that taken as a whole, the regulars and Guardsmen represent the units of several field armies into which they might be quickly assembled should war with Mexico come.

The purpose of the United States to withhold all arms and ammunition shipments from Mexico "as long as this menace continues" is announced. It was learned today that plans have been laid by the Navy and Treasury departments to aid in stopping such shipments by water, while the military patrol of the border will close that route.

Another preparatory step by the Navy was the decision of Secretary Daniels to ask the Senate to add authorization for approximately 10,000 enlisted men to the pending naval bill, which, as the House, provides for an increase of 11,000 over the present strength.

Reserves Would Be Needed. Mr. Daniels explained that the necessity of putting many small ships usually held in reserve, into commission for service in Southern waters made it imperative that the Navy be recruited up promptly. It is possible the authorization for the increase will be sought in a separate measure to avoid delay. Should war come, the personnel of the fleet must be immediately increased. The aviation corps and other auxiliary service must

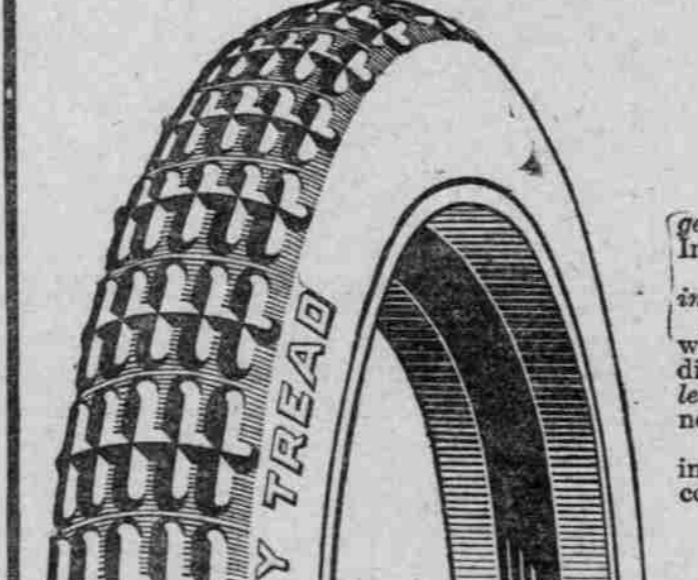

STRIKERS BOUND OVER MAILCARRIER MILITIAMAN AIDS DEPUTY IN CAPTURE.

Men Accused of Beating Strikebreakers Give Officers Merry Chase--Preliminary Hearing Waived.

Herbert Fietcher and Joseph Kelly, striking steamboat men, arrested early yesterday, following a general fight at Fifth and Taylor streets, in which several strikebreakers were badly beaten, waived preliminary examination before Municipal Judge Languth yesterday and were bound over to the grand jury on charges of inciting a riot. The ball of each was placed at \$75.

John H. Stevenson appeared as attorney for the defendants. The men were arrested by Deputy Sheriff E. S. Streeter and Patrolman E. P. Converse after a chase.

When the officers appeared on the scene the fighters began running. Deputy Sheriff Streeter, in an automobile, overtook Fietcher, but the lat-

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
