

DISAPPEARANCE OF CANTINE PIZZLES

Chief Deputy of State Highway
Department Missing Since
Last Week.

WORK AT BEND ABANDONED

Friction With State Engineer Lewis
May Be Cause—Head of De-
partment Makes an Effort to
Find His Subordinate.

SALEM, Or., June 21.—(Special).—The whereabouts of E. I. Cantine, chief deputy engineer in the State Highway Department, under State Engineer Lewis, is puzzling Mr. Lewis, that of Lewis admitted today. Although efforts to locate the chief deputy have been made for the past week, Mr. Lewis said neither he nor any of his deputies could find him.

About two weeks ago the State Highway Commission resigned Cantine to work under Lewis, when the latter gave assurances to the Commission that he would treat his chief deputy with the same consideration as he would wish to be treated were he in Cantine's place.

Inharmonious Is Charged.
Prior to this Cantine had been taking orders from the Commission direct, because Lewis had refused to assign him to work in the Highway Department, on the ground that there was no room for him to do and because he said Cantine's presence made for inharmonious. Between the State Engineer and chief deputy strained relations have existed since the Supreme Court ruled that Lewis should conduct the Highway Department in place of Cantine.
The probability that Cantine may have decided to quit the department was the subject of some speculation here today when it became known that the chief deputy had disappeared. When the Highway Commission assigned Cantine to work under Lewis at its last meeting, the State Engineer sent the chief deputy to Bend to supervise the opening of bids for the construction of 15 miles of a new road running south from Bend.

Successor Takes Charge.
"Mr. Cantine reported to me that all the bids were too high," said Mr. Lewis, "and I told him to get a force together and that the state would do the work. With the machinery which the state owns on the Tumalo project and that loaned by the county the road can be built at a comparatively light cost. Since then I have heard nothing from Mr. Cantine, and county officials are unable to locate him. He is not there. They told me he had left for Portland."

"Unable to get in communication with him in Portland by wire, finally I sent another of my deputies, Mr. Ross, to Portland, but he reported that Cantine could not be located there. That the work on this road may not be delayed, I ordered Mr. Ross to go to Bend, and if he could not find Mr. Cantine to get the work started himself. I expect to hear from Mr. Ross tomorrow."

Portland Restaurant Man Takes School-
day Sweetheart to Vancouver at

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 21.—(Special).—Coming all the way from St. John's, Newfoundland, to meet her sweetheart at school days, Miss Isabel M. Ewing, a pretty 21-year-old miss, was married to Herbert G. Bradley, a restaurant man of Portland, in the office of the county Auditor here after 9 o'clock last night.

It was only a few hours after her arrival in Portland, whence she had come at Bradley's call, that they came to Vancouver together and were married. Though it was several hours after time for the marriage license bureau to close, Mrs. May R. Hackett, local county Auditor, obligingly went to the Courthouse and issued a license.

Justice of the Peace W. S. T. Derr was called and the ceremony was performed in the Auditor's office. Two friends from Portland and the local officials witnessed the ceremony. Bradley left his home in New Foundland several years ago and came West in search of fortune. In a dairy lunch business in Portland he built up an income sufficient to send for his sweetheart.

WOMAN, 66, FOUND DEAD

Attack of Epilepsy Is Believed to
Be Cause of Death.

Mrs. Starr, aged 66 years, was found dead in her room at the house at 25 1/2 North First street yesterday at 5 o'clock. The discovery was made by the landlady of the lodging-house, Mrs. Luddington, where Mrs. Starr had been for some time. The woman had evidently been dead, according to Assistant City Physician Thatcher, for at least four hours.

According to Deputy Coroner Smith, the woman was subject to epileptic fits and had apparently succumbed from violent one. Her head was under the bureau and her body half clothed.

Mimi, Bohemian, is a pictured opera, adapted from the story made famous by Henri Murger and sung by Cavallieri and Caruso. The picture is a French director, Albert Capellani, the French director, permeating his offering with atmosphere, which allures as well as convinces. The girl dies, but with Rudolph present and happy in his love.

BEER' PROVES WHISKEY
NEW METHOD TO BEAT DRY LAW
AT ABERDEEN SUSPECTED.

Express Packages Marked as Contain-
ing Beer Show 16 Bottles of
Liquor Were Substituted.

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 21.—(Special).—A new method, which in the opinion of the local police might have been employed to beat the dry law, was unearthed here yesterday when the police opened four express packages, all labeled as containing beer, but each of which really contained 16 bottles of whisky of nearly one quart capacity.

Whether the persons to whom these packages were shipped can be arrested on any charge based on a violation of the dry law is a question which the police have referred to City Attorney A. E. Cross to answer.

Two of the packages were opened in the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Wiley in the presence of Prosecutor C. N. Baker, who had been assigned the duty of running down the case. When the consignees opened the packages, they expressed surprise that they contained whisky, declared that they had ordered beer and refused to accept the shipment.

Chief of Police Schmidt believes that this system of getting whisky into the city has been employed frequently.
