

RIVERS STAGNATING

Upper Columbia and Snake Stages Reported Higher.

WILLAMETTE TO COME UP

People's Line Ties Up All Steamers on The Dalles Run Except Bailey Gatzert Until Conditions Change—Rain Is Short.

Rains in the interior, as well as in this district and south of Portland, had an appreciable effect on the stage of water and, instead of a decline that was expected to continue so long as lower temperatures prevailed, the opposite is forecast, rises being reported on the Upper Columbia and on the Snake.

At Portland there was a trace of a decline, the gauge reading at 11 o'clock in the morning being 21.7 feet above normal and at 6 o'clock last night it was 21.6 feet, and an upward tendency is predicted, District Engineer Beal's estimate of the stage of the river at this point is to be 21.3 feet today, 22.1 feet tomorrow and 22.3 feet Thursday.

Unofficial advice from Upper Columbia River points last night showed a considerable rise during the day. The Dalles reported the stage of the river at 11 o'clock yesterday to be 21.6 feet, an increase of five inches since the Weather Bureau's daily report, made at 8 A. M. At Wenatchee a rise of 11 inches in 24 hours was reported.

Because of the change on the Columbia River the Regulator line canceled the sailing of the steamer State of Washington for The Dalles last night. Yesterday was her layover day and she will make trips Monday, Wednesday and Friday until conditions change. The company also has the steamers Dalles City and Stranger, which will only steam during the summer months.

Tahoma Held at the Dalles. A long-distance telephone message from The Dalles yesterday was to the effect the steamer Tahoma, of the People's line, would be held there, it being determined not to attempt a resumption of service until falling water eliminated the strong current at the Cascades.

Portland is shy of rain this month, judging from past records at the weather bureau, the total being 1.47 inches, while the average from June 1 to 26 in past years has been 38 of an inch. There have been heavy rains along the Upper Columbia and Upper Willamette during the past 26 hours, but the prospects are there will be showers today and clearing weather following.

Higher water than has been noted for years is predicted on the Columbia here in July by A. C. McDonald, who has just returned from a 10 days' trip in Montana, where he found winter still on in all its fury.

June Snowfall Heavy. "I saw a harder snow storm in Kallispell for six hours Monday than I ever saw before," said Mr. McDonald. "Flat-head Lake is higher than it has been in 25 years and the snow on the mountain farm land along the Kallispell Valley are inundated.

The mountains are full of snow. In Glacier National Park gangs of men are blasting the snow out of the trails so that the tourists can get along.

"That snow and what water will come down the Columbia sooner or later, so it looks to me like the highest water I have seen for many a year will be experienced."

SAN RAMON SOLD IN EAST

Parr-McCormick Line Sells Wooden Carrier at Marked Advance.

Sale of the steamer San Ramon, of the Parr-McCormick fleet, for \$250,000 here in July by A. C. McDonald, who has been disposed of on the Atlantic coast, where she went a few weeks ago. The vessel was recently purchased by the Parr-McCormick line from the Dodge interests, also the steamer Northland, the latter being under charter in the Puget Sound-Alaska trade at present.

The San Ramon is a wooden ship, built at North Bend, Or., in 1913, and is 193.3 feet long, with a beam of 41.6 feet and depth of hold of 14.6 feet. The San Ramon is estimated to have been built for \$150,000 and the new owners are expected to have paid the largest price ever received on the Pacific Coast for a wooden vessel of the type and capacity, who having been built to carry 1,000,000 feet of lumber. She is 592 tons net register.

The Parr-McCormick interests have about gone out of the general cargo trade, being flooded from the bottom by the steamer Davenport, which left San Francisco Sunday night, is consigned to them.

GRAHAMONA IS FLOATED

Steamer Will Be Back on Portland-Corvallis Route by Saturday.

By means of canvas stretched over a jagged hole in the hull of the Yellow Stack steamer Grahamona, which was sustained at 10 o'clock Saturday, when she struck a snag on Eola Bar, above Salem, the vessel was raised. At 1 o'clock last night and shifted to Salem. She is expected to leave there today for Portland to be repaired and will depart from Portland Saturday morning for Corvallis, resuming her schedule.

The steamer Gray Eagle, of the Spaulding fleet, assisted in pumping water from the hold. The Grahamona having been flooded from the boiler forward, and the damage was located below the firebox. Dredging has been carried on at Eola Bar to provide sufficient water at lower stages, so it is supposed the snag encountered had been carried into the cut by prevailing high water.

CAPTAIN THOMSEN IS BACK

Captain Kirkwood Gets New Billet in Navigating Tanker Lucas.

On the arrival in the Columbia yesterday of the Standard Oil Company's tanker Atlas, towing barge No. 91, Captain Oscar L. Thomsen made his appearance in these waters, he having taken command of the tanker Lucas, formerly known as the "Rockefeller yacht," at San Francisco, where Captain Kirkwood, her master for about two years, shifted his bag to the tanker Lucas.

It is understood here that Captain Thomsen was the master of the tanker J. A. Moffitt and that Captain Kirkwood will have in charge the tanker Lucas. The fleet at San Francisco includes Captain Thomsen, now on the Atlas, is a son of Captain Dan Thomsen, known from one end of the coast to the other and for years in the tugboat service out of the Golden Gate. The skipper of the Atlas is particularly well known here because of his long command of the steamer Geo. W. Elder under the North Pacific flag.

SEAS FILL CRAFT THROUGH OPEN PORTS AT KAKE, ALASKA.

Crew Is Rescued and Some Stand by to Raise Vessel, Now Lying Undamaged in 40 Feet of Water.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—The steamer Northland, owned by the Border Line Transportation Company of Seattle, sank yesterday off Kake, Alaska, in heavy seas, according to a message to the Chamber of Commerce marine department here, received today. All aboard were saved. The steamer Humboldt picked up 13 survivors.

The vessel was reported lying in 40 feet of water on a soft bottom with a cargo of 400 tons of coal and 200 tons of cannery supplies. The Northland left Seattle for Alaska points June 18. The sinking of the Northland was believed to be due to the carelessness of some member of the steward's department, who left the vessel's ports open. A heavy swell struck the Northland, which filled and slowly went down. It is not known whether she was at her pier or about to tie up.

Captain A. Wite, Chief Engineer Walter Cox, Second Officer August Nyvett and three members of the crew are standing by the Northland. It is expected that the task of raising the vessel will be easy, if the Northland's ports and hatches and the Northland will be pumped out and floated. She is entirely undamaged. The Northland is owned by the Border Line Transportation Company.

The sunken Northland was known as the "Little Northland," to distinguish it from the larger vessel of the same name. It is credited by Lloyds with a gross tonnage of 845.
