

ORPET'S TALE IS
RE-OLD BY WHEELSWhile Witnesses for Defense
Testify Defendant At-
tends to Mail.

SCORES OF LETTERS COME

From Halifax to Spokane and South

Girl Poisoned Herself.WAUKESHA, Ill., June 30.—William
H. Orpet, having told his story of the
death of Marion Lambert, a task he
completed yesterday, the recital was
placed on trial today. That, at least,
was the comment that his chief of
counsel, James H. Wilkerson, put on
the day's evidence and much that will
follow.Today's array of witnesses summoned
to support the defendant's assertion
that he did not poison Marion and
that, therefore, she must have com-
mitted suicide, were used for the most
part to prove that Helms Woods was
the last place which a murderer de-
liberately would select as the scene
of his crime.The witnesses called on this point
were Gale M. Brooks, a civil engineer;
James Anderson, Jr., the assistant in
mapping Helms Woods; W. W. Hurley,
a photographer, who "took pictures"
of the place from almost every angle
and of almost everything in it; Henry
D. Walsh, a conductor on the Chicago
& Milwaukee electric line, and John D.
Staffney, his motorcar driver. Also
Henry J. Cox, weather forecaster at
Chicago, testified as to his February
records, that being the month in which
Marion came to her death and Orpet
was arrested.Mr. Brooks asserted that from the
three trees where Marion's body was
found he easily could see Anderson
walking in the woods and around the

with perfect distinctness. Curley's

of £20,000 to his nephew, Henry Ham-
ilton Kitchener, and the Broom's Park
estate and all lands in Kent County to
his nephew, Commander Henry Frank-
lin Chevalier Kitchener, of the royal
navy, a son of the earl.To Colonel Oswald A. G. Fitzgerald,
Lord Kitchener's personal military sec-
retary, who was with him at the
Field Marshal, was willed all Kitch-
ener's land in British East Africa,
amounting to about 5000 acres, with
plantations, etc.The will was dated November 2,
1914.
Earl Kitchener's autograph letter,
calling for \$50,000 recruits for the new
army, was sold today at auction for the
benefit of the Red Cross to Thomas
Penwick Harrison for £800.Mr. Harrison will present the letter
to the nation.

SECURITY COUNCIL MEETS

Cabinet Officers Begin Work of
Listing Defense Resources.WASHINGTON, June 30.—Six Cab-
inet officers, composing the new "Coun-
cil of Executive Information for Co-
ordination of Industries and Resources
for National Security and Welfare,"
held a preliminary meeting today at
the War Department.Co-ordination of military, industrial
and commercial resources to "render
possible in time of need the immedi-
ate concentration and utilization of the
resources of the Nation," is the object
of the new body. It is composed of
the Secretaries of War, Navy, Interior,
Agriculture, Commerce and Labor.An initial appropriation of \$200,000
for investigations, employment of ex-
perts and other activities is carried in
the pending Army appropriation bill.

AT HOOD RIVER.

Trip to Baltimore Is Made on Standard

Oil Tanker—Carranza Held Too

Weak to Rule.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 30.—(Spe-

timore and immediately proceeded West.

matter how insignificant, to begin an

ALASKA RATE PROBE SET

INTERSTATE COMMISSION TO INVE-

STIGATE RAILROADS.

All Carriers Except Government Line

Come Under Charge of Monop-

oly and Discrimination.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—The Inter-
state Commerce Commission today or-
dered an investigation into the Alaska
railroad and steamship situation as a
result of charges that the American
Smelting & Refining Company and the
Kennebec Copper Company have been
able to monopolize and control the
copper industry in the territory through
railroad and steamship favoritism.
Complaints against the carriers were
signed by J. D. Wickersham and the
Sampson Hardware Company, which
said it was unable to continue in busi-
ness because of advantages given its
competitors.
The inquiry is directed at all car-
riers except the Government railroad.
The Commission will establish joint
rail and water rates to Alaska and in
the territory on the facts developed.

TROOPS TO GET EXTRA PAY

Foreign Service Will Add 20 Per

Cent for Men of Ranks.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Extra pay
for foreign service will be allowed the
American troops serving across the
Mexican border under a decision today
by Controller Warwick of the Treasury.
Enlisted men will receive 20 per cent
additional and officers 10 per cent.The Controller also gives the opinion

full pay from their civil position for
the first 30 days of their service, ex-
cept that the combined salaries of of-
ficers will be subject to the \$2000 limi-
tation provided by law.
