JOB FURNISHED 2261 IN JUNE.—Work was furnished to 2261 persons during June by the Municipal employment bureau, according to the monthly report yesterday of Director Johnson. Of the positions, 65 per cent were of a permanent character. The Bureau received 630 registrations for work and had 2018 calls for men. Of the 2261 positions furnished, 130 were berry pickers. Sixty-four occupations were represented in the positions furnished.

POSTAL STATION A MOVES.—Postal Station A, East Portland, was moved yesterday afternoon and evening from the old quarters at the corner of Union avenue and East Alder street, to the new location on the north side of East Alder street, between Grand avenue and East Sixth street. Superintendent Ott was in charge of the moving. The old station was occupied a little more than ten years and in that time several carriers have been added and where mail was then delivered once a day there are now two deliveries. Persons having business with the station will find the office open this morning to the new quarters. The equipment is all new and modern.

CARVER CARS IN OPERATION.—Freight cars are being operated on the new line of the Portland & Oregon City Railway from Carver, at Clackamas River, and to the present end of the line at East Twenty-second and Powell streets. From that point to the Portland end, East Third and East Morrison streets, the track has not yet been laid, but it is announced that track laying will be resumed soon. It is planned to continue the track to East Morrison and East Third streets, where the passenger station will be located. There is some talk of the company operating auto buses from the station to the new quarters.

Lazarus asserts in a suit filed in the Circuit Court yesterday, that the collection of this amount from the estate of the late R. T. Dabney. The architect was employed in August, 1915, and Mr. Dabney died February 3, 1916. Mrs. Martha A. Dabney, executrix of the estate of her husband, refuses to pay the bill of the architect, it is charged.

ESTATE VALUED AT \$45,000.—Lamech Harlow, who died in Portland June 21, has left an estate valued at \$45,000, according to a petition for letters of administration filed by the widow, in the County Court yesterday. Mr. Harlow left a wife, Mrs. Lamech Harlow, and four children, a son, Percy Harlow, in Seattle.

TRADE STATUS EYED

Japanese Consul Sees How War Affects America.

REPORT WILL BE MADE

K. Kumasaki Engaged for Nipponese Government in Studying Conditions—Important Middle Western Cities Visited.

K. Kumasaki, consul for the Japanese government at Portland, has been assigned to the important task of making an investigation for Japan as to how American markets are affected by the war and the status of trade conditions in this country. He is engaged in this survey at present and expects to complete it within the next few weeks.

The plan of the Japanese government contemplates an investigation of world conditions and to Mr. Kumasaki falls the work of conducting the inquiry in the United States.

He has recently completed a trip through the West to ascertain the trade status, visiting the important cities West of the Mississippi River. From what he has learned of the investigation to date, Mr. Kumasaki feels encouraged as to prospects of improved trade relations between the United States and Japan.

"I have found everywhere," said Mr. Kumasaki, "a good opportunity for Japanese goods and I feel the time all favorable for the interchange of commerce between the United States and Japan. The situation is most encouraging."

Japan is said to be making greater efforts than ever before to take a larger place in world trade. The present war is believed to offer the best opportunity ever given. Japan is growing richer, it is said, and Japanese business men are showing an increasing tendency to make investments abroad.

One great company, the Mitsui Bishi, will open a branch in New York City, in addition to the one in London, for the purpose of handling the American Asiatic trade, which is expected to increase largely after the war.

Jap Ships to Carry Goods.
 A raw cotton company is expected to be established at Tacoma by the Cotton Company and raw cotton from the American fields to the Japanese mills will be handled by this concern. This commodity is one of the others exported or imported into Japan, is expected to be carried in Japanese ships.

The Japanese are said to be building ships at a rate never before equaled and an advance of 50 per cent in the cost of materials has not caused a halt in this activity. Cheapness of labor is believed to give that country great advantages in building a large merchant marine. Figures have been compiled that show there are no fewer than 27,000 employed in the Japanese shipyards.

The purpose of the Japanese is reported to be to establish branches and agencies everywhere so that when the war is over they will be in a much stronger position commercially than they have ever been before.

 KIAMATH FALLS, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—William H. Lockman, an employee of the Welch sawmill at Kiamath Falls, east of this city, dropped dead while working at the mill this morning. Coroner Whitlock was immediately notified and it was learned that valvular heart trouble was the cause of the death. Lockman was 34 years of age and has resided in Kiamath County for the past four years. He had a homestead near Meadow Lake. Lockman's parents reside at Stuart, Neb., to which point the body will be sent.

GOLF MEASURE TO PASS
 Mr. Dieck Removes Opposition Provided Emergency Is Omitted.

In face of the acceptance by the city of the municipal golf link offer of the Ladd estate being delayed for 30 days unacceptably, Commissioner Dieck yesterday withdrew his opposition to Commissioner Baker's programme in connection with the offer yesterday and a new vote was taken.

The ordinance accepting the offer originally was repealed with an emergency, making the repeal effective at once. It is proposed next week to repeal the ordinance without the emergency, which action will open the way for the invocation of the referendum if anyone wants to block the establishment of the links and the recreation center planned. The proposition has been opened because of statements made by members of the Civic League that they wished to block the project but had been prevented from so doing by reason of the original ordinance having been passed with an emergency clause.
