

CARS HIT; 8 HURT

Mrs. Susie Fennell Pipes Is Seriously Injured.

BRAIN INJURY SUSTAINED

Auto She Drives Meets Machine of E. P. Converse in Head-On Collision in Irvington—Others Also Are Victims of Cars.

Mrs. Susie Fennell Pipes, wife of Attorney John M. Pipes, and violinist of exceptional talent, is at Sellwood General Hospital suffering from concussion of the brain, as the result of a motoring accident occurring yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. Mrs. E. A. Thurber, of Colorado Springs, who is the house guest of Mrs. Pipes, also was bruised severely, but was able to leave the hospital late yesterday afternoon, returning to the Pipes home, 562 Carlton avenue. Mrs. Thurber was formerly Miss Lucile Abrams, of Eugene.

The accident took place at East Thirteenth and Knott streets, when the car driven by Mrs. Pipes collided with the car of Ernest P. Converse, patrolman, of 260 Michigan avenue. Both machines were wrecked and occupants of the Converse car were also painfully injured.

In the car driven by Mrs. Pipes were her husband and daughter, Cornelia, and her guest, Mrs. Thurber. With Mr. Converse were his wife and father, J. P. Converse, Mrs. N. L. Mueller, 523 Michigan avenue; Mrs. P. Winkback, and her son, Jack, of 100 Prescott street.

Cars Meet Head On.
Mrs. Pipes was driving north on East Thirteenth street, while Mr. Converse was going east on Knott street. As the machines reached the intersection, and the collision was imminent, Mr. Converse attempted to evade the crash by swerving his machine. The effort was futile, and the cars came together with great force. The Pipes car was forced into the curb, with one front wheel torn off and its engine demolished. The Converse car continued its way and crashed into a telephone post. The front of the car crumpled to the impact.

From her seat at the steering wheel Mrs. Pipes was thrown to the street, her foot catching in the tonneau door. In this position she was dragged for a short distance, her head striking against the pavement. Her daughter was also thrown from the car, alighting in the street without injury other than bruises. Mr. Pipes was also fortunate, being but slightly cut about the head and lamed from his fall. Mrs. Thurber suffered from bruises and shock.

Two machines of the Ambulance Service Company sped to the scene of the accident, immediately conveying Mrs. Pipes and Mrs. Thurber to Sellwood General Hospital. Mrs. Pipes was but partially conscious.

Cars Not Speeding.
In the Converse car Mrs. Converse and Mrs. Mueller were the most severely injured. Mrs. Mueller was thrown against Mrs. Converse and both were injured about the hips. Other members of the party, but slightly cut and shaken and suffered from nervous collapse. They were taken to the Converse home by the Ambulance Service Company in a third machine.

Both Mr. Pipes and Mr. Converse agree that the cars were not traveling at an excessive speed. Mrs. Pipes is thought to have been due to a failure of either driver to note the angle of approach. Both cars were at the point of impact, and either of the drivers noted the danger.

Late yesterday Mrs. Pipes was reported to be resting well at the hospital, although still dazed by the shock. Mrs. Converse and Mrs. Mueller were also confined to their beds from shock and bruises.

815 INDORESE OPEN SHOP

Only 16 Members of Chamber Vote Against Board's Stand.

Partial returns on the open shop referendum, which is being held by the membership of the Chamber of Commerce at the request of the board of directors, show 93 per cent of the membership endorsing the position taken by the board.

In a total of 835 ballots returned thus far, according to the report of Manager Hardy at the meeting of the executive committee yesterday, 815 endorse the stand of the board for open shop and only 16 oppose it. Seven ballots have been returned signed but indicating no vote one way or the other.

The executive committee yesterday authorized the appointment of a committee of three to take full charge of the campaign in Oregon in behalf of a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia River.

None Hurt When Auto Drops.

Though their auto slid and dropped nearly ten feet, when it left the Columbia Highway near the Moffitt Creek bridge on Tuesday, F. H. Chow and members of his motoring party escaped injury. Four adults and an infant were in the car. As it left the course it slid down the grade and rolled over. It was pulled back to the road uninjured, and the party proceeded on their way.

There is now practically no limit to the movements of the motor car, as the restrictions which have barred them from the Yellowstone Park, Bar Harbor and Mount Desert have been removed.

FARMERS IN FIELD DAY

GRANGE MEMBERS AND FRIENDS
TO GATHER JULY 29.

Addresses, Music and Picnic Will Be
Features of Assembly at Gresham Fairgrounds.

Arrangements for the proposed farmers' field day to be held on the fairgrounds in Gresham July 29 have been completed. At a meeting of the committee of arrangements Sunday Chairman J. J. Johnson announced that W. J. Kerr, president of the Agricultural College, and State Master C. E. Spence had accepted invitations to speak. Invitations have been sent to Governor Withycombe, of Oregon, and Governor Hester, of Washington. Mayor George Stapleton will deliver the address of welcome.

H. A. Darnall, J. W. Mills, E. L. Thorpe, R. I. Anderson, R. W. Gill and H. A. Lewis are the committee on amusements. A chorus of 100 voices will be trained by Mrs. Anna Patten for the musical part of the programme. Every Grange in the county is expected to contribute singers to the chorus. Mrs. Jennie Kronenberg has been selected as accompanist.

Three songs have been selected from

the Grange song book, "Oh Columbia, We Love Thee," "Triumph and Toil" and "Merry Childhood's Home." The singers will rehearse these songs separately and then together in two rehearsals, the first to be held Sunday, July 25, with Lents Grange, and the second with Gresham Grange, July 23 at 2:30 P. M.

In addition to the chorus there will be a quartet and several solos. Beyer's band will be engaged for the day. Arrangements of the grounds will be in charge of H. A. Lewis.

The day will be celebrated by farmers and their families, whether they are members of the Grange or not. Those who attend will be expected to bring basket dinners for themselves and invited guests. Hot coffee will be provided on the grounds.

MILWAUKIE RECALL UP

EFFORTS ARE MADE TO UNSEAT
TWO COUNCILMEN.

Friction Over Marshalship Cause
for Desired Removal of Herman
Leeding and F. C. Harlow.

Captain F. C. Harlow and Herman Leeding, members of the Milwaukie Council, face a recall election if they do not resign at the next meeting of the Council, July 11. Petitions for their recall have been prepared and will be submitted to the Council. It is planned to circulate the petitions and hold the recall election early in August. It was intended to include H. N. Hopkins in the recall, but he resigned at the last meeting of the Council. Leo Shindler, being elected in his place.

Captain Harlow and Mr. Leeding have been active in the erection of the new Bull Run water plant, and undertook to oust City Marshal Sam Riley and merge his office with that of superintendent of the water works and streets, but they encountered bitter opposition of the marshal's friends. Besides they have not been in harmony with Mayor G. C. Pelton's policy.

It is understood that Mr. Leeding has prepared his resignation, but it is not known what Mr. Harlow will do. Mr.

Leeding said yesterday that he was tired of the bitter wrangling and factional spirit displayed, but wanted simply to remain in the Council until the municipal water plant had been completed and paid for and that has now been practically accomplished. Mr. Leeding incurred the enmity of the friends of the new schoolhouse by opposing the \$20,000 bond issue, holding that it would throw too much of a burden on the taxpayers, with the water and improvement bonds in addition.

The regular city election will be held next November.

SON OF PIONEERS PASSES

The son of pioneers passed away in the death of William Woodworth, which occurred on Tuesday, July 4, at Winlock, Wash. His father was the late F. N. Woodworth. He was born in Marion County, Oregon, April 19, 1854.

Three daughters survive him. Mrs. Laura Robbins, of Winlock, Wash.; Mrs. Ben Thyarks, and Mrs. Eva Carter, of California. Mrs. H. E. Jolly, of Portland, and Mrs. S. V. Wade, of Tacoma, are sisters. One brother, V. M. Woodworth, lives at Butte Falls, in Southern Oregon. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World Lodge, No. 77, and of the Foresters.
