**ADAIR BURIAL SATURDAY**

**FATHER OF CARRIZAL HERO NOT APPRISED OF SON'S DEATH.**

**Pioneer of 1840 Descended From Illustrious Stock—Lieutenant Adair's Body on Way Home.**

Funeral services for Samuel D. Adair, father of Lieutenant Henry R. Adair, who was slain in the Carrizal ambush in Mexico, will be held from Grace Memorial Episcopal Church, East Seventh and Weidner streets, Saturday at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in Riverside Cemetery.

Adair died at Good Samaritan Hospital Wednesday night, following an illness of some weeks. The news of his son's valiant fight and death at Carrizal has been withheld from him owing to his extreme weakness.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. Oswald W. Taylor, pastor of Grace Memorial Church. The Edward Holman Company will direct.

Samuel Dickinson Adair, a pioneer of 1840, was born in Kentucky in 1847. He was the grandson of General John Adair, who served as Governor of Kentucky and as Senator from that state, and who was commander of the Kentucky Riflemen at the battle of New Orleans.

Mr. Adair was one of the first salmon packers on the Columbia River and for several years was a partner of the late A. Booth. With the exception of the last 10 years, his whole life was passed in Clatsop County. He was married to Mary Rodney Morris, daughter of the late Bishop Morris, in 1889.

The body of the late Lieutenant Henry Adair, U. S. A., will be brought to Portland for burial. Instructions to that effect were telegraphed yesterday to the military authorities at El Paso by the dead officer's brother, W. M. Adair, of this city.

The following telegram was received by Mr. Adair yesterday from the superintendent of the Wells-Fargo Company at El Paso:

"Lieutenant Adair's body here. He has been embalmed and placed in sealed casket. In charge of Lieutenant Pratt and other former classmates. Wire forwarding instructions."

**BROADWAY PLAN MAY FAIL**

**Extension Likely to Be Given Up Because of High Assessment.**

**Companions of Woman Who Tried to Commit Suicide Are Held.**

With her attempt at self-destruction thwarted, Mrs. Josephine Mills, 26 years old, lies in Good Samaritan Hospital, where it is said that she has every prospect for recovery. The woman fired a revolver shot through her body, just below the heart, in an apartment at 549 Taylor street on Wednesday night.

Her companions, Mrs. N. P. Nelson and R. F. Warren, were held by police for investigation, and a charge of disorderly conduct placed against them and Louis Billups, a chauffeur,

who came to the police station and surrendered himself to Detective Goltz, and Howell. Warren was released. An alcohol bottle was found in the apartment occupied by Mrs. Nelson, Mrs. Mills and Billups.
