OAKLAND LETS "VET" GO

Former Valuable Moundman, Although Only 33 Years Old, Has Seen Service With National Game in Various Leagues.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 7.—Irvin C. (Hig) Higginbotham, veteran pitcher, bought by Oakland from Portland a month ago, has given his five-day notice of resignation.

Higginbotham was sold by Portland to Oakland on June 11. His sale came as a big surprise, although he had not been offered by the Mackmen just before he was sold.

Higginbotham was reared in Oregon, and in his younger days pitched semi-professionally in various parts of the state. He was the oldest member of the Beavers up to the time of his sale to the A.C.G.S.

Higginbotham has won four and lost eight games with Portland and Oakland this season. Last year was the first time that Higginbotham pitched in a full season since joining the Beavers. At that, his mark last year wasn't bad, considering the fact that he was in the basement. He won 13 and lost 17 last season.

In 1914 Higginbotham practically pitched Portland as a team, when he won 31 and lost 20 for an average of .608. He won 21 and lost 14 when the Beavers won the flag in 1913. In 1912, with a club that finished in fourth place, he won 19 and lost 12 contests. Higgy is 33 years old and came to Portland from the Toledo Mudhens, of the American League, in 1911. He was secured by Toledo from the Cleveland Americans. Prior to playing with Cleveland, he saw service under Frank Chance, when he pitched in both the Chicago Cubs, and was in the Northwestern League.
