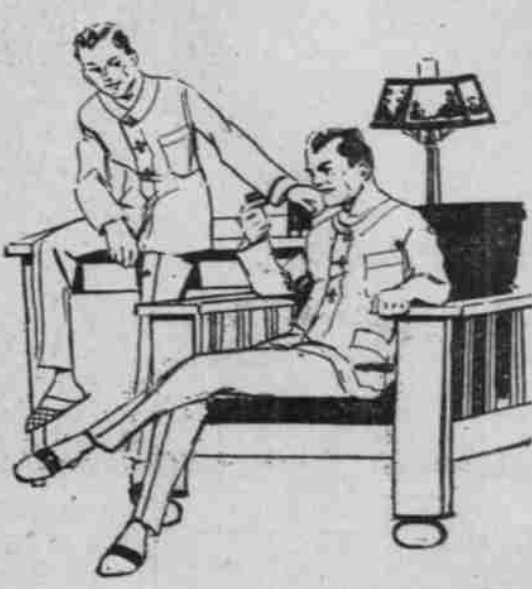

WOMAN SAVES ANOTHER**GEORGE STEELE IS ACCUSED OF ATTACKING MRS. SHANNON.**

Cries Are Heard by Passerby, Who Bursts Into Home While Fight Is On and Help Is Called.

Through the pretext that he wished to use the telephone, George Steele, of 288 East Sixty-third street, North, obtained entrance to the home of Mrs. Esther Shannon, 1630 Halsey street, yesterday morning. Mrs. Shannon says that he then attempted an attack. Steele was later arrested at his home by Motorcycle Patrolman Bales and taken to the City Jail.

No sooner had Steele entered the door, Mrs. Shannon declares, than he attacked her and dragged her to an inner room. The woman fought fiercely and her cries were heard by Mrs. E. Hahn, of Sixty-eighth and Halsey streets, who was passing the house. Mrs. Hahn burst into the house and hastened to the room. As the second woman entered Steele is said to have cursed both Mrs. Shannon and Mrs. Hahn. He left the house and they telephoned to the police station.

When Patrolman Bales reached Steele's home, Mrs. Steele told him to take her husband to the jail, as he was drinking heavily of alcohol and had choked her earlier in the day. Steele is 34 years old and is a laborer.

SUNDAY LAWS ARE PLAYED

Pastor Says Sabbath Restrictions Should Be Resisted.

"The Church and State" was the subject of the lecture of Rev. P. G. Hayward, at the Seventh-Day Adventists

tant, corner Belmont and East Eleventh streets, last night. He declared that so-called Sunday laws are dangerous to the liberty of the people and should be resisted.

The subject for tonight is "Universal Peace? Are We to Have It?" Rev. Mr. Hayward will discuss the outcome of the European war, the Mexican trouble and all international tangents of the present day, and will answer the question, "Is there to be peace or more trouble?" from the biblical standpoint. Friday night the subject will be, "Is the Cradle of the Nations to Become Their Death Bed?" which will deal with the events which led all Europe to the present war.

TALE BEARERS BLAMED

Courthouse Engineer Says Discharge Is Result of "Frameup."

George H. Nelson, formerly employed as engineer at the Courthouse, declares that an apparent "frame-up" was responsible for his discharge June 30. A communication urging his reinstatement was read before the Board of County Commissioners yesterday. The communication was placed on file.

Mr. Nelson said he was notified of his discharge over the telephone by W. A. Etchell, superintendent of machinery, who told him it was "for the good of the service."

"Stories had been carried to Mr. Etchell of how I was trying to secure his position," he says. "That was false."

Powers Restaurant Robbed.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—Sheriff Alfred Johnson has been on the lookout in several sections of the county for a man who robbed the till of the restaurant at Powers of \$80.

The robbery took place during the night. Residents of the logging town told the sheriff they suspected a party of three who were seen to be flush with money the next day, but before had been without funds. Before the officers could visit the town and search for the suspect he had disappeared.

HONOR PLAN IS URGED**J. W. SCOTT HAS SYSTEM TO RID CITY OF RECKLESS DRIVING.**

Motorist Advocates That Driver's License Be Issued and Revoked When Carelessness Is Proved.

Regulation of traffic in Portland by a system of license whereby drivers are put on their honor to refrain from reckless or careless driving and are subject to loss of their license to drive if they violate safety rules, is to be advocated by J. Walter Scott, formerly Detroit manager for the Automobile Trade Journal. He says this plan will solve the traffic problem better and more quickly than any ordinance the City Council can pass.

"In two weeks I can guarantee that such a system will make the streets safer than they were before motorists were built," said Mr. Scott yesterday. Mr. Scott contends that much of the reckless driving is due to the fact that motorists generally are insured against accident and consequently take chances because they are protected against financial loss. To eliminate unsafe driving he would have a committee to report violations. Conviction on the first offense would deprive the owner of the use of his car for 30 days, the second conviction to bring the permanent revocation of his driving license. By appointing to this committee only men in whom the public has confidence, Mr. Scott believes that reckless driving would be a thing of the past in a short time.

BRIDGE ORDINANCE PASSES

By Unanimous Vote Measure Goes Into Effect Immediately.

Commissioner Bigelow's ordinance establishing new rules for traffic on the bridges over Willamette River was

passed by unanimous vote yesterday by the City Council. An emergency clause was attached making the measure effective at once.

Under the terms of the measure traffic is divided into two classes, fast-going and slow-going. On the Broadway and O.W. R. & N. and Morrison bridges slow-going vehicles shall keep in a column next to the right curb line. Fast-going vehicles may proceed anywhere between the right curb and the center line, but no vehicle shall cross to the left of the center line. It is made unlawful for any driver to jockey or maneuver for any advantage of position.

On the Burnside and Hawthorne bridges fast-going vehicles shall keep to the right in single column. Slow-going vehicles shall keep to the center roadway. Vehicles are prohibited from passing other traffic. The rules on all bridges include the approaches to the bridges.

STATE GETS CITY'S REWARD

Attorney La Roche Would Seek Way of Keeping Fine Money Received.

When the city was required yesterday under the terms of the prohibition law to turn over to the state \$299 taken during June as fines for violations of the prohibition law, request was made of City Attorney LaRoche that some means be devised whereby the city might retain the money taken in this way.

It is intended by members of the City Council that the city has to go to the expense of prosecuting the cases and that it is justly entitled to the revenue from the fines. City Attorney LaRoche says he believes some system can be devised.

Re-election Is Sought.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—A. C. Canterbury, Lewis County Superintendent of Schools, today announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for re-election. Professor Canterbury has made an efficient Superintendent and so far as is known he will have no opposition.

BOYS YIELD TO SWINDLE**17-YEAR-OLD WORKS BUNCO GAME AND GETS BICYCLE.**

Donald Morrison and Harold Polivka, 12 and 11, Desert Wheel to Get Gift and Lose Both.

Donald Morrison, 12 years old, 210 Curry street, and Harold Polivka, 11 years old, met a 17-year-old bunco stealer yesterday morning. The police are now looking for Don's bicycle, the theft of which was reported by the boys.

At the Morrison-street entrance of Meier & Frank's store they encountered a looting youth, who told them that the big department store was giving away bicycle horns on the fifth floor. Don deserted his wheel, and both he and Harold hastened to the fifth floor. Before they had inquired for the supposedly free horn, suspicion came to Harold.

"Maybe it was just a make up for him to take it away," he said to Don. They sped to the street in grave alarm—just in time to see their informant and the bicycle disappearing around a street corner.

The boys waited an hour for his return. Then they went to the police with their story.

BOOTLEGGERS FINED \$500

Herman Glezek and Wife Released Pending Good Behavior.

Herman Glezek and his wife, Anna Glezek, who were arrested on a charge of bootlegging at 58 Cook avenue, pleaded guilty in Circuit Judge McGinn's court yesterday morning and were given maximum sentences of six months in the County Jail and \$500 fine. Sentence was suspended during good behavior and they were released.

The two were arrested after they had

sold a quantity of liquor to Patrolman Richards, of the moral squad. They were fined \$200 in Municipal Court and appeared before Judge McGinn yesterday on an appeal.

Efforts were made to obtain a light sentence on the grounds that the patrolman had regained a stomach ache in order to secure the liquor from the defendants. This was denied by the state.

Most of Crater Lake Road Open.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—According to Dr. R. R. Hamilton, of this city, automobiles now can go to within two miles of the rim of Crater Lake. Dr. Hamilton went to the lake yesterday and returned this afternoon. Plows and other road implements are being used on the last two miles and within a short time the entire distance can be made by auto-

mobile. Many visitors are already coming into the park.
