GLADSTONE PARK, Or., July 12.—
(Special.)—Three things helped to
make the biggest day in years at
Gladstone Park today. The Kekuku
Hawaiian Quintet, the Grand Army of
the Republic patriotic day programme
and Miss Nola Crispien and her Junior
Chautauqua presentation of King Ar-
thur's court all vied for headline hon-
ors among the Chautauquans. Folks
came from miles around to enjoy these
features and more than 5000 were in
attendance.

For the first time in years the 11
o'clock-forum-hour programme filled
the big auditorium. The Grand Army
had the time of their lives as guests
of Chautauqua and they, in turn, put
on a great programme with Dr. C. E.
Cline, of Portland, as the speaker. In
addition, the famous drum corps, the
veteran's male quartet and the Kapella
Ladies' Quartet, of Portland, rendered
musical numbers that caught the fancy
of the big audience.

Elimination of Hyphen Asked.
Dr. Cline's talk was a popular one
with Chautauquans. He hit the funda-
mentals of real Americanism, praised
the schools, urged an absolutely non-
sectarian school system, advocated a
stiff tightening up of the law, and
lastly, urged his hearers to elimi-
nate the hyphen in these days of
international turmoil.

Dr. J. E. Hall, department commander
of Oregon, also made a strong patriotic
appeal. The old boys, 200 in number,
made a most impressive appearance on
the big platform of the auditorium
and received a great ovation from the
Chautauquans.

Miss Nola Crispien, who has had charge
of the Junior Chautauqua, performed
somewhat of a miracle in her presen-
tation of "King Arthur's Court" today.
With one of the best of the had the
children wonderfully schooled and the
beautiful pageant went off without a
hitch. Miss Crispien reading the legend
as the plot unfolded.

Little Miss Emmeline Mehl made a big
hit with her dancing numbers, as also
did Master Haldane Hamed and Violet
Montgomery. All are Portland chil-
dren.

Musicians Recalled Often.
One of the best numbers of the as-
sembly was the appearance of the Ke-
kuku Hawaiian Quintet, who rendered
a great reception from the great crowd
present, and were forced to give an
extra, half-hour's programme before
the audience would let them go. They
were on the programme again tonight
and were even more popular.

Dr. Sutcliffe's 10 o'clock hour today
was devoted to a discussion of Henry
Van Dyke's "Footprints of Peace." He
said:

"We are told by Van Dyke to despise

ment.

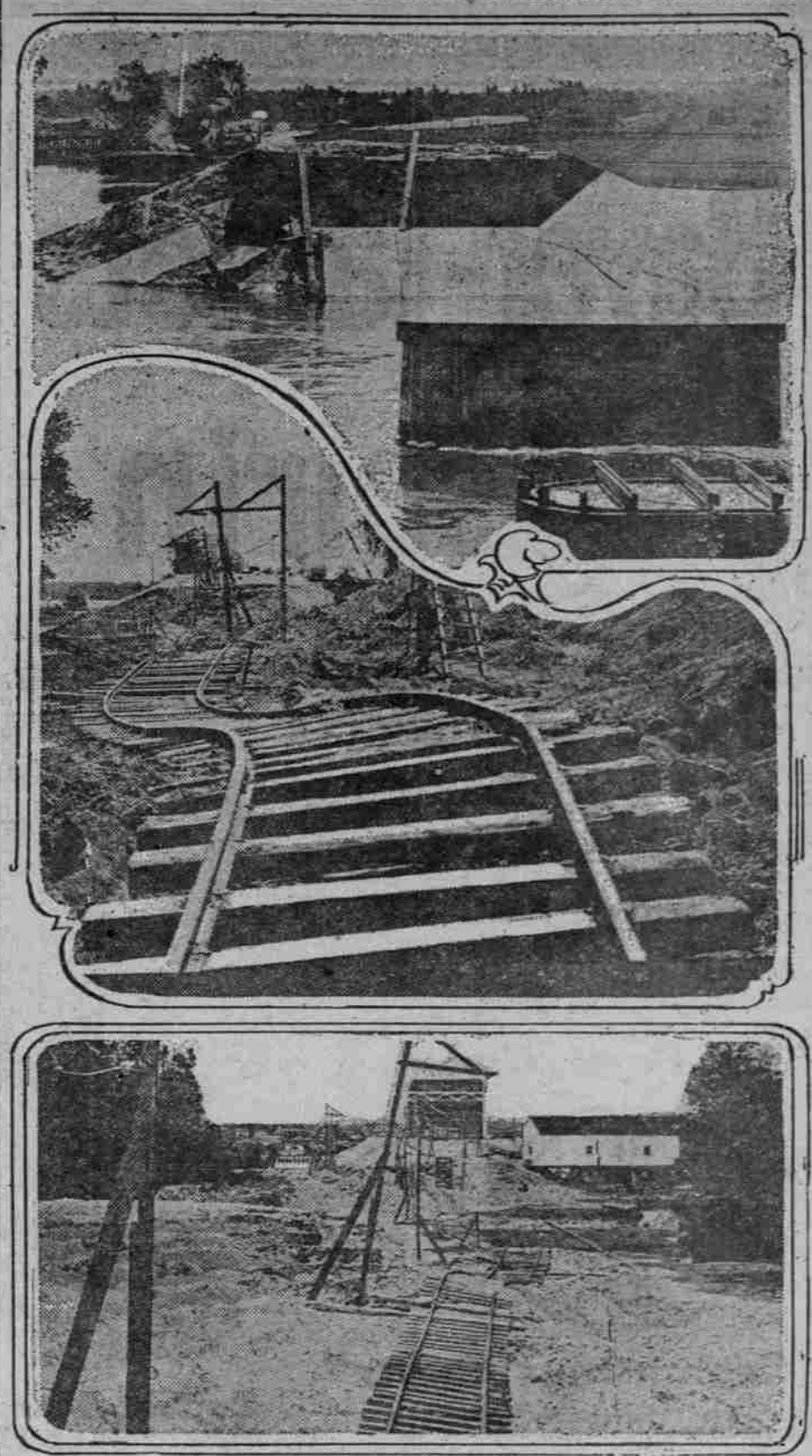

SLAYER TO BE ARRAIGNED

Umatilla County Man to Have Hear-
ing in Baker Today.

BAKER, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—
Bert Hopkins, self-accused slayer of
L. M. Egger near Durkee yesterday,
will be arraigned tomorrow on a charge
of second degree murder, before Jus-
tice E. L. Hubbard.

Hopkins was brought to the Baker
County Jail by Deputy Sheriff Robert
Nelson late last night. The only con-
tradiction which has been found in the
hardy's story is his statement that he
was pasturing the sheep on Government
range. John Harrison, a neighbor
of the slain man, told the author-
ity that he had seen the animal graze
on Mr. Egger's land. Hopkins said
he had lived in Umatilla County prac-
tically all his life.

Mr. Egger's funeral was held today
from the Harrison home.

WOMEN IN BATTLE ROYAL

Hair and Blood Flies When North
La Grande Neighbors Mix.

LA GRANDE, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—
Mrs. Cloverdale, a young woman
of North La Grande, this afternoon
matched wits with the city's legal
lights and contested the testimony of
four women and a boy. Mrs. Cloverdale
was arrested for disturbing the peace,
it being contended that she provided
provocation for attack by the wit-
nesses referred to. Neckties and arms
were bitten, hair pulled, eyes black-
ened, and noses bloodied by the ex-
change of blows.

start suit against their neighbors be-
cause they were "called vile names."

FORAGE PLANTS THRIVE

Grain Crops in Winona District to
Be Late This Year.

WINONA, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—
This season has been unusually fa-
vorable for the growth of grass and
forage plants. Stockmen here have
never had so much native grass in
their pastures. Alfalfa has made a re-
markable growth, and many farms
are worried over the harvest, won-
dering how they will be able to han-
dle the grain mixed with so much Jim
Hill mustard. Portions of fields prob-
ably will not be cut. Harvest operations
will not start until August.

RECORD CROP INDICATED

Mosier Cherry Yield Expected to
Break Record by 18 Tons.

MOSIER, Or., July 12.

The biggest cherry crop of the Mosier
district will be harvested by the end
of this week and it will probably reach
total of 108 tons for the district, the
Royal Anne cherries which are being
sent to the Libby, McNeill & Libby can-
nery in The Dalles are estimated at 90
tons. This exceeds the record of 87
tons made three years ago and far ex-
ceeds the estimates made on the crop
at the first of the season.

The rains which have split many
cherries would have allowed a still
larger crop, but not the heavy down-
pour occurred.

RANCHERS WAR ON WEEDS

Fourth Annual Campaign Begun in
Baker County.

BAKER, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—
Baker County ranchers are making
their fourth annual crusade against
Canada thistle, Jim Hill mustard and
other noxious weeds. The fight started
in the Wingville and Pochontas dis-
tricts, and is being carried on in every
part of the county. The campaign is
being carried on by the appointment
of a weed warden in each district, who
will act to invoke the state law pro-
viding that the county shall cut the
weeds and charge the cost to the
owners.

By these campaigns the county is
being practically cleared of all noxious
weeds.
