

METER OWNERS TO SPRINKLE AT WILL

Water Ordinance Changed as Result of Protest by Members of Laurelhurst Club.

HOURS FOR OTHERS STAND

Experiment Will Be Watched Carefully and Tabulation Kept to Compare Results With Last Year on Temperature Basis.

A change in the manner of lawn sprinkling was made by the City Council that will be welcome news to at least one-fifth of Portland's water consumers.

Club Files Protest. Mr. Reed said that the club had gone to the expense of installing its own meters and found it impossible to sprinkle sufficiently through the restricted hours without the employment of additional men and the creation of much greater expense.

The amendment that becomes effective immediately will affect approximately 20 per cent of those who do sprinkling. About 37 per cent of all water users in the city are served through meters, but a part of that number represents commercial houses, hotels, etc., that are constrained to use through metered service in accordance with the city ordinance.

New Test Given. The amended section of the ordinance passed November 25, 1915, will now read: "If water is used for sprinkling purposes without first signing an application, the water will be shut off from the premises and not turned on again until such application is signed, the annual charge for sprinkling is paid and the payment of \$2 additional for the turn-on fee is made at the water office."

The amended section of the ordinance will be used in an experiment for the remainder of the summer season. Close tabulation will be made according to daily temperatures on the amount of water used this year and last, so that a definite comparison between the two systems may be arrived at.

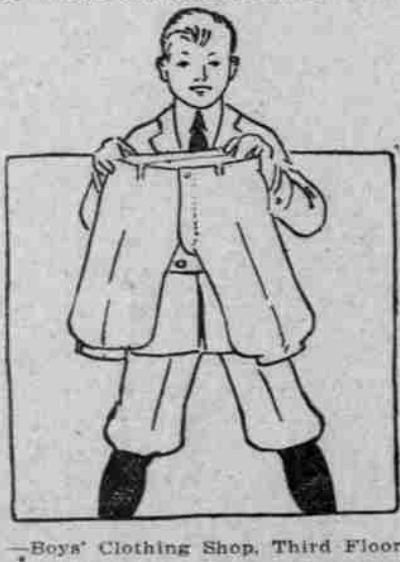
