

RICH LUMBERMAN SOLD FOR PRICE

Niece of Wife Central Figure
in Sensational Suit Against
Charles W. Embody.

PLEA RECITES CRUELITIES

Wife Declares Wealthy Timber Own-
er Asked Her to Start Action so
He Could Wed Affinity; Alimo-
ny of \$750 Month Sought.

"Helen, I love you! I love you! I love you!" Charles W. Embody, wealthy Portland timberman, murmured one night in his sleep. At least his wife, whose name is Lillian, says that he did. And she has a niece whose name is Helen.

Alimony of \$750 a month, a one-third interest in timber holdings valued at more than \$125,000, \$3000 for attorneys' fees and the return of jewelry worth \$5000 are demanded by Mrs. Embody in her suit for divorce filed in the Circuit Court yesterday. The talking in his sleep, and particularly the mention of a name, confirmed, she alleges, all the suspicions she had.

Compounded by ill-treatment and abuse heaped upon her that she might be forced into suing for divorce are recited by Mrs. Embody, who maintains that her husband wishes to get rid of her that he may marry her niece, Helen Clark.

Discord Enters Home.

Discord entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. Embody, who had lived in conjugal happiness since their marriage in Everett, Wash., June 19, 1911, with the arrival in Portland, in April, 1915, of Miss Clark, of Washington, and she came for a visit with her aunt. Her visit was extended until November, 1915, when she was ordered out of the house by an indignant spouse, who asserts she saw her husband and niece in compromising circumstances many times.

Mrs. Embody asserts that her husband is still supporting Miss Clark in Portland and is awaiting the opportunity of marrying her. She claims that Miss Clark is living in an East Side apartment-house with her mother, Mrs. Lucinda J. Clark, a widow. Mrs. Clark denied indignantly last night that Mrs. Embody was paying any bills for her daughter. Miss Clark would make no comment on the divorce, except to express her regret that what she termed imputed and false statements should be given publicity.

Since September 1, 1915, Mrs. Embody has endeavored to force Mr. Embody to secure a divorce, primarily, so his wife accuses, that he may marry the niece.

Reign of Cruelty Charged.

Mrs. Embody charged that he commanded her to secure a divorce without any notoriety, threatening as an alternative to ruin her happiness and good name. Refusal to begin divorce proceedings, Mrs. Embody asserts, precipitated a reign of cruelty. Beginning with indifference to her, Mr. Embody is accused of pursuing a course of studied mental torment. He spread false reports as to her character, she asserts, giving rise for the first time before she married him she was of immoral character and that she continued to be intimate with other men after marriage.

He wrote her brother and sister in the East of his wife's alleged delinquencies, she maintains. One person with whom he accused her of being intimate, she contends, was named Lengfeld, a friend of her family, old, blind and infirm.

Love for Niece Asserted.

Not content with this, Mrs. Embody would call his wife vile names, refuse her credit at stores, refuse her medicine or medical attention when she was sick, refuse to be seen on the street with her, and order her out of his office in the lumberman's building, threatening to call the police, she charges. She believes this to be true because of what she overheard him say in his sleep, she asserts, though not admitting that her husband said, when faced with accusations later, that he had been awake and had said what he did to anger his wife.

Their handsome home in fashionable Irvington was given up by her husband when Mrs. Embody made known her refusal to sue for divorce, she asserts, and a house taken in Sellwood, away from carlines and without telephone communication. On the pretext that they were not safe there, her husband induced her to give him her diamonds and other valuables, worth \$5000, for deposit in a vault downtown, she says, and refused later to give them back.

Thus, Mr. Embody is further charged. Mrs. Embody to sign away all her right to their joint property and destroyed an unrecorded deed given her to five lots in Terrace Addition to Portland is further charged.

April 15, 1915, Mrs. Embody caused to be inserted in Portland papers notices that he would not respond to her for any debts contracted by his wife.

Mr. Embody has large timber holdings throughout the Northwest, but his chief interests are in Curry County, Oregon. There he owns more than 7000 acres, containing more than 400,000,000 feet of standing timber.

There are no children.

OFFICE STAYS VACANT

No Successor to Be Named to
Harry Bulger.

SUICIDE HINTS RECALLED

Continued Ill Health and Significant Remarks Lead to Belief
Act Premeditated; Funeral Probably Tomorrow.

No successor to Harry Bulger, chief probation officer for Multnomah County, who shot himself Sunday, will be named, County Judge T. J. Cleton announced yesterday. His duties will be apportioned among other officers of the juvenile and County Courts until the end of Judge Cleton's regime.

The suicide, it is believed, was premeditated. It was the culmination of weeks of melancholic brooding, apparent only to a few who knew Mr. Bulger well.

For a week past his nervousness had increased, and Saturday appeared to his coworkers. Knowing his health was bad, and believing that a change would help him, Judge Cleton had suggested that Mr. Bulger take his vacation now. But the probation officer insisted that he was well enough to work, and is reported to have told his wife that he feared he was going to be discharged.

H. M. Dukes, chief deputy probation officer, asked Mr. Bulger Saturday if he would take his vacation soon, so that when Mr. Dukes went to American Lake the vacation dates would not conflict.

"Can you let me know Monday?" he asked.

"Oh, you'll know Monday, all right," was the significant reply of Mr. Bulger. Mrs. Elizabeth G. Cosgriff, head of the home-placing department of the



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LOCAL CONDITIONS VIEWED

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She has come West to help in the fight for prohibition that is expected in British Columbia this fall.

"The liquor interests will cite the bad effects that prohibition has worked on communities that have the prohibition law," said Mrs. Scott yesterday, "and we want to have data from as many places as possible to combat their statements."

"We are practically assured of having prohibition in British Columbia, for the Liberals are pledged to both prohibition and equal suffrage and the Conservatives have promised to abide by a referendum on both questions."

"Most of the provinces of Canada are already dry and in those provinces where liquor is still sold many of the municipalities have local option."

In the province of Quebec the Roman Catholics are not quite certain if prohibition is the best thing for the people. There are great temperance advocates, however, and Archbishop Bruchet is one of the most noted. He has given the first communion to some 200,000 children in the 15 years he has been there and each one has signed the pledge that holds until the age of 21 years. The first communion is given until the pledge has been signed.

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Some arrangement with government dispensaries will have to be made to furnish liquor for medical, sacramental and mechanical purposes.

"In Saskatchewan even the government dispensaries are being voted out. Alberta became entirely dry July 1."

Mrs. Scott said that she thought one of the effects of the war in Europe upon England would be the granting of equal suffrage.

Mrs. Scott's interview with Mayor Albee was much to her liking, as she was given the fullest information of the reduction of crime and drunkenness, as well as the increase of the credit of the workmen due to the passage of the prohibition law in Oregon.

8000 VISIT OAKS PARK
