

WHEAT BREAK

Wheat Drops 2 to 4 Cents at Merchants' Exchange.

DECREASE MADE IN SALES

Reports Indicate Eight or Ten Million Bushels of Wheat Changed Hands During Latter Part of Last Week in This Section.

The first break in the general advance in wheat quotations, since the price started sky-rocketing the first of last week, occurred yesterday in the Portland market.

A drop of from 2 to 4 cents for the different grades of wheat was recorded at the noon session of the Merchants' Exchange and the general tendency was for a weaker market.

The wheat market was unusually active in Portland, Walla Walla, Spokane and other large grain centers of the interior.

Practically no sales of the 1916 crop of hops are reported in the Portland market at the present time and the general tone is quiet.

Weather conditions in Oregon have thus far been highly favorable for the growing crop.

Little hop trade is reported with buyers, the majority of whom are waiting for the end of the old season and possibly longer.

The heavy demand for lemons and the small supply which is reaching the local market at the present time, an advance of 25 cents a box was announced in the quotations for that fruit on Front street yesterday.
