

OPPOSING COMMANDERS ON ITALIAN FRONT

STANISLAUS UNDER GUNS OF RUSSIANS

Letchitsky Quickly Follows Up His Advantage and Begins New Drive.

BOTHMER IS OUTFLANKED

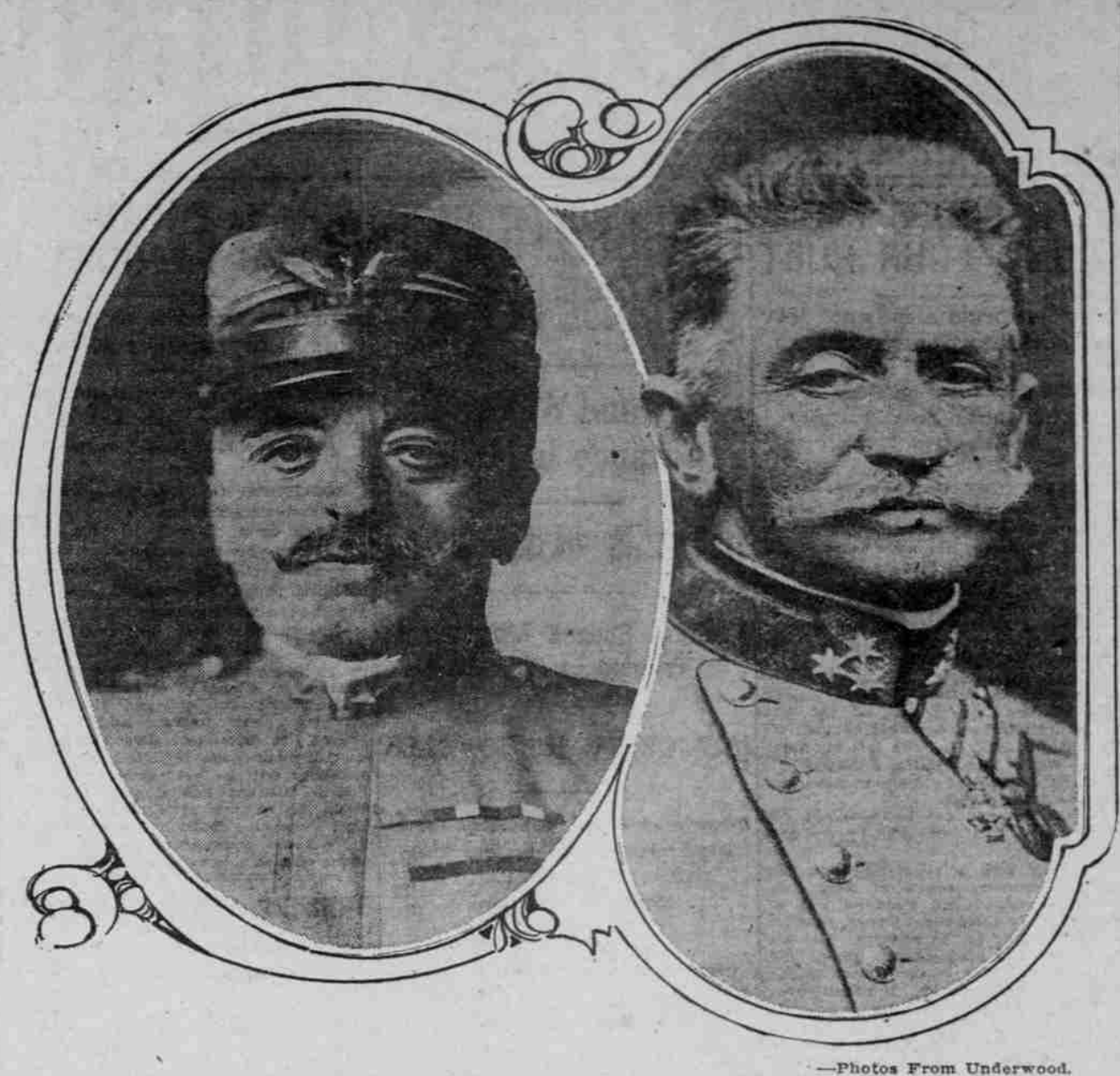
Austrians Fighting Hand-to-Hand Combats in Efforts to Stem Advance—Brussiloff's Prisoners Total 402,000.

PETROGRAD, via London, Aug. 10.—The town of Stanislaus is already within the range of the Russian guns. The Russian General Letchitsky, losing no time in following up his victory at Tysmenitsa, has pushed westward along the railroad and northward along the wagon road and in the latter direction has approached to within six miles of Stanislaus. Simultaneously, he has announced a drive across the Strupice river and the formation of a new line of advance north of the Dniester.

Hitherto General Count von Bothmer had enjoyed more or less protection for his right on the Tarnopol position from the flooded Dniester. The appearance of an offensive in the neighborhood of Dniester, which has already carried the Russians as far west as the crossing of the railroad at Nisimoff, 20 miles east of Stanislaus, injects an entirely new element into the situation.

With Monasterzyska seriously flanked, General von Bothmer finds himself with General Letchitsky in the rear of his advanced position along the Strupice and in close touch. The Austrians are vainly striving to stem this new advance by desperate counter attacks, in which the troops engage in hand-to-hand encounters, but apparently with the outcome always favoring the Russians.

The counting of General Letchitsky's prisoners during the three days' operations show that he has taken upward of 15,000 and it is estimated that 10,000 more men were put out of commission. This would bring the grand total of prisoners to General Brussiloff's credit since early in June to 402,000.

ITALIANS MOVE ON

Cavalry Continues Pursuit of Austrians in Open.

STAGGERING BLOW STRUCK

Total of Prisoners Increased to 22,000—With Menace to Flank Removed, Advance Along Coast Is Expected Soon.

city the Italians are pushing forward, moving along the railway that runs east to St. Daniel and then curves southward to Trieste. The cavalry, scouring the plain in advance of the infantry is moving on rapidly.

Meanwhile another movement is under preparation for a direct advance on Trieste along the Adriatic coast. This will follow the line of the railway through Montebelluna. The drive on the Carso plateau, in which progress was made today, is paving the way for this advance.

For more than six months the Italians have held strong positions at Montebelluna and were awaiting the fall of Gorizia before beginning the advance along the coast. Unless their flank and rear were protected such a move would be attended with grave peril.

The fall of Gorizia removed that menace and London expects within a short time the beginning of the coastal advance along the railway running directly to Trieste.

STRONG LINES ARE PIERCED

Italians Continue to Pile Up Victories in Isonzo Region.

ROME, via London, Aug. 10.—The Italians have pierced the strong Austrian entrenchments northeast of Monte San Michele on the Isonzo front and near the village of San Martino, the War Office announced today. They have occupied Boscini, the statement says. More than 12,000 Austrians have been captured thus far in the offensive, the War Office said. The Italians have taken 255 officers and 12,672 men.

PARIS, Aug. 10.—"The city of Gorizia was virtually in our possession after the evening of August 8, when the fortified barriers west of the city were taken by assault by the Third Army and our forces crossed the Isonzo, notwithstanding the destruction of bridges by the enemy," says a semi-official statement forwarded from Rome by the Havas agency.

"Our advance attack on the main bridge began August 6, so that in a battle of three days the most important fortified position on the Isonzo front fell into our hands. It was carried as the result of one of the most violent attacks on a fortified position that has occurred in the European war. It should be remembered that Austria had given particular attention to the fortifications of Gorizia, which, owing to the difficult nature of the ground and the manner in which the heights had been fortified, were regarded as impregnable."

Thursday's War Moves.

ALTHOUGH bad weather is hampering the British and French maneuvers in the west, both the Italians and the Russians are keeping up their strong offensives against the Teutonic allies, respectively, in Austria and Galicia, and at least reports both have made additional important gains.

On the Isonzo front the Italians have continued to throw their forces across the river, and have fought their way to the east of the captured city of Gorizia. In addition, southwest of Gorizia they have taken strong Austrian entrenchments near Monte San Michele and Monte San Martino, and also occupied the town of Dosechini, giving them a freer hand for their operations in the region of the Dobrodo plateau and southward toward the Monfalcone sector. Large numbers of prisoners were taken in the fighting.

Vienna, in admitting the loss of

Gorizia, says the evacuation followed the repulse of new Italian attacks on the Dobrodo plateau and that the straightening of the Austrian lines made necessary by the operation was carried out without molestation from the Italians. Vienna also reports that 4100 Italians have been taken prisoner in the recent fighting in this region.

In Galicia, in the sectors of Stanislaus and Halicz the Russians have driven their forces further westward in their endeavor to capture the central portion of the railroad running from Kolomoie to Lemberg. Passing across the Monasterzyska-Nizimoff Railway, they have forced the Ziota Lipa River southwest of Halicz and south of Stanislaus have captured the town of Krypin, on the Stanislaus-Nadwornia Railway.

The Berlin official communication says that along the front of Archduke Charles Francis, in Galicia, southwest of Walewska and south of the Dniester, new positions have been occupied by the Teutonic allies in accordance with previously arranged plans. Russian attacks along the Strumen and Stokhod rivers were repulsed with sanguinary losses to the Russians. Another big battle has started near Brody, in northern Galicia.

Owing to inclement weather in Western France, military activity has been confined principally to bombardments, which were somewhat heavy north of the Somme and in the Thalaumont work sector near Verdun. An attempted German advance against the British line south of Martinpuich was put down by the fire of trench mortars and machine guns, according to London.

Pierce fighting is still going on between the Turks and Russians on the Mush-Bitlis front in Turkish Armenia.

A squadron of 21 Austrian aeroplanes has dropped a large number of bombs on Venice, causing numerous fires in the historic city.

McKENNA'S CRITICISED

BRITISH CHANCELLOR URGED TO ISSUE ANOTHER LOAN.

Reply Made That Nation Is in Position of Man Whose Yearly Income and Debts Are Equal.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, was subjected to criticism in the House of Commons today on the ground of overreliance on treasury bills, his critics arguing that the large amount of ship bills outstanding constituted a danger to the government's credit and to have issued another war loan.

In the course of his reply, the Chancellor asserted that Great Britain was able to borrow abroad at much lower terms than any one belligerent power. He estimated the nation's total indebtedness at the end of the present financial year to be \$3,440,000,000.

From that amount, said the Chancellor, the nation was entitled to deduct \$800,000,000 lent to allies and dominions of the empire, the sum left being a burden it could well sustain and it was virtually balanced by the present national income.

In fact, he declared, Great Britain was in the position of a man whose income was \$5000 and whose debts amounted to \$5000, which was not an alarming position.

BILLINGSLEYS ARE FREED

Charges of Murder of Seattle Policemen Are Dismissed.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 10.—Charges of first-degree murder preferred against Fred and Logan Billingsley, drugstore proprietors, in connection with the killing of the night of July 24, Police-men John P. Weedon and Robert H. Wiley in a pistol fight with Billingsley, were dismissed in police court today.

In announcing dismissal, Police Judge John E. Gordon said the prosecution had failed to present any evidence which tended to connect the Billingsley brothers with the death of the policemen.

Special Train May Be Run.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Unless some man decide to make the trip by automobile, the Young Men's Republican Club will arrange for a special train to take Harborites to Tacoma next Tuesday to hear Charles E. Hughes, Republican Presidential nominee, at the Stadium. Harbor Republicans will also march in a body in the big parade.

HUNGARY FIGHTS ON

Party Leaders Repudiate Rumors of Peace Talk.

NATION TO FIGHT TO LAST

Premier Declares Himself in Accord With View That People Will Resist as Long as Man Is Left Alive.

AMSTERDAM, via London, Aug. 10.—A telegram from Budapest says that Count Michael Karolyi, leader of the new independence party, speaking in the Hungarian Chamber of Deputies, asserted it would be in the interests of peace if the government would make a declaration in regard to the war aims of the monarchy and the conditions demanded for terminating the struggle. Although he desired a speedy peace, he wished it to be a lasting one.

Referring to Rumania and the aspirations supposed to be cherished there for possession of Transylvania, the Count said:

"So long as a Hungarian breathes we shall fight unflinchingly for the integrity of Hungary and the defense of Transylvania."

Count Albert Apponyi, leader of the opposition, who has accepted the programme of Count Karolyi, said he saw the danger of the government's attitude in the strengthening of the monarchy's alliances.

Premier Tisza said in reply that he desired only to say, as was known, that a noisy section of the Rumanian press had done everything possible since the outbreak of the war to involve Rumania in war with Austria-Hungary. The Premier added that the ridiculous calumny that Count Karolyi desired peace at any price and a separate peace with Russia had made a certain impression on Rumanian public opinion and on the contents of the press.

He declared emphatically his agreement with Count Karolyi's view that as long as a Hungarian was left alive the Hungarian nation would resist to the utmost any attack upon its integrity.

'RUSSIAN' BAND HOAX

PORTLAND MUSICIANS POSE AS CZAR'S ENTERTAINERS.

However, Their Playing Is Good and Uniforms Gaudy, So Tacoma Commercial Club Is Satisfied.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—Whether Portland musicians constitute a Russian military band, "which has enthralled the czar in the Winter Palace at Petrograd," is a question troubling members of the Tacoma Commercial Club. Philip Pelz, Russian bandmaster, is now filling a week's engagement at the Tacoma Stadium under the auspices of the Commercial Club.

The soloists brought to the city by Pelz have given entire satisfaction and the band in concert selection was considered excellent on the first night. It was not until today that the alleged hoax became known and it was found that many of the members of the band were a long way from Russia when it came to joining the organization. It is said that they were recruited in Portland and Seattle, and while they are perfectly good tooters they are strictly domestic and do not possess the glamor of imported players.

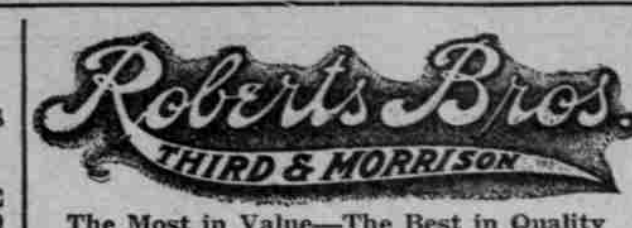
