MARINER MUCH ESTEEMED

Ploneer Skipper Is Credited With Having Towed First Big Log Raft to California-Many Here Lament His Death.

On a final voyage from the Columbia River to the Golden Gate, a course over which he had sailed regularly for years, the body of Captain Edward Jahnsen, Commodore of the McCormick fleet, was taken aboard the steamer Willamette, of that line, at Astoria last night to be buried at San Francisco. night to be buried at San Francisco. Captain Jahnsen was stricken with apoplexy Friday night at Astoria and is said not to have regained consciousness and died at 2 o'clock yesterday morning.

No master mariner along the Pacific Coast was more highly esteemed among friends and acquaintances than Cap-tain Jahnsen and every man on the waterfront yesterday who had known him took time to narrate some incident of his life or work with the departed mariner. Captain Jahnsen is credited with having towed the first cigar-shaped log raft from the Columbia River to California, a departure under-taken years ago and was regarded as a feet in transportation and which has feat in transportation, and which has since grown to a regular movement every season.

The initial raft was for the Hammond Lumber Company and Captain Jahnsen commanded the steamer Arctic, of that line. He was in that service for a lengthy period and brought the steamer Francis H. COOS BAY SURVEY PLANNED


