PETROGRAD, via London, Sept. 5. 2:10 P. M.—Russians and Bulgarians are fighting in Roumania, the War Office announced today, and the Office announced today, and the first clash between the Bulgarians, who have invaded Eastern Roumania, and the Russians, who went in to assist Roumania, occurred yesterday. A Bulgarian cavalry outpost was sabered by Russian cavalry.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—The first day's fighting on Roumanian soil, due to the invasion of Dobrudja by Bulgarians and Germans, is said by the Bulgarians War Office to have resulted in the retreat of the Roumanians, who left hundreds of dead on the field.

Frontier Towns Occupied.

As previously reported by the German War Office, the invaders crossed the entire Dobrudja frontier and occupled towns near the border. The statement, issued in Sofia on Sunday,
