

STRIKE EXTENSION IN GOTHAM PLANNED

Steps Taken by City and State
Officials for Arbitration
Are Unavailing.

BOTH SIDES TO BE HEARD

Hebrew Trades, Numbering 200,000
Members, Represented at Labor
Conference—Fatal Car Ac-
cident Is Investigated.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—After Mayor Mitchell and the Public Service Commission had taken steps late today to terminate the transit strike in this city by urging that it be immediately declared off and that both sides arbitrate their differences, plans to continue and extend the strike were discussed tonight at a meeting of the United Labor Conference of Central Bodies of Greater New York.

After the conference, Hugh Frayne, New York State organizer of the American Federation of Labor, issued the following statement:

"The consensus of opinion among the members of the various organizations represented was that the railroad officials must be met with the sort of force they are applying to the men."

Frayne declared that the United Hebrew Trades were represented in the conference for the first time. These trades, it is said, have a membership of 200,000.

Representatives of the strikers announced tonight they would not comment on the plans of the Mayor and the Public Service Commission to have the strike arbitrated until they appeared before the Commission tomorrow. Both sides then will be permitted to express their views.

An investigation by the Coroner after an accident in the Bronx this afternoon in which two persons were killed and many others injured when a car got beyond the control of an inexperienced motorman and crashed into an automobile, revealed the strikebreakers previously had been employed as truckmen. Minor disturbances occurred in several places during the day.

Traffic on the surface car lines affected by the strike was suspended again tonight. Subway and elevated train service continued about normal.

The attitude of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company officials was shown tonight at the directors' meeting, when resolutions were passed approving the stand Theodore P. Shonts, the company's president, has taken in refusing to deal with "any labor organization which has broken any agreement with the company."

DEMOCRATS PLAN TOURS

Dozen or More Will Speak in Central and Western States.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—A dozen or more well-known Democratic speakers will begin tours of the Central and Western states within a few days in behalf of Wilson and Marshall. The list will include Vice-President Thomas R. Marshall, Senators Underwood, Hoke Smith, Shafroth, Robinson and James Hamilton Lewis; Judge Albert D. Norton, William J. Bryan, Senator William J. Stone, Senator James A. Reed and John J. Lee.

Vice-President Marshall, it is said, will speak in nearly every Western state, after a trip through Utah, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, California and Oklahoma. Senator Reed will tour Missouri with a tent. He will open his campaign at Kansas City September 14. The Democratic speakers will pay particular attention to Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri, Washington, Utah, Montana, Oregon, California and Oklahoma.

Judge Norton will speak in Missouri from September 26 to October 6, and then make a trip through Utah, making a special appeal to Progressives.

John J. Lee, of Ohio, will open his speaking tour in Iowa October 2 and after a week in that state will go to Missouri.

Senator Shafroth, of Colorado, will tour his home state and later speak in Utah and Wyoming.

22 MEXICANS DIE IN WRECK

Spread Rail Causes Disaster in State of Chihuahua.

EL PASO, Tex., Sept. 12.—Twenty-two persons were killed when a north-bound passenger train on the National Railway of Mexico struck a spreading rail near Ortiz, Chihuahua, about 75 miles south of Chihuahua City, last Sunday, according to reports received in Juarez today.

The train was crowded with soldiers and civilians when it struck the defective track. Several cars were turned on their sides. The meager reports at the border said that about one-half of those killed were Carranza soldiers, bound from Torreon to Chihuahua City, and that the others were Mexican civilians.

NEVADA WANTS LOAN BANK

Federal Board Hears Statements of Probable Advantages.

RENO, Nev., Sept. 12.—The Federal Farm Loan Board today heard statements from Nevada people touching on the probable advantages that will accrue to Nevada through the operation of the farm loan act.

Reno's claim as to the location of the Farm Loan Bank to be established in this district was presented to the board by people from all over the state and from Northern California. Tonight the board travels East.

Lieutenant Is Made Major.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 12.—First Lieutenant Albert Brockway, of the Tenth United States Cavalry, located "somewhere in Mexico" today, was commissioned Major of the first squadron of California Cavalry by Governor Johnson. He succeeds Major S. W. Kay, of Sacramento, who was disqualified by the physical examination.

Harvard Gets Army Officer.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 13.—Captain Constant Cordier, United States Army, has been designated to head the new department of military science and tactics at Harvard. It was learned today. He will become a professor of the college and commandant of the reserve officers' training corps.

WILSON GOES HOME

President Advised That Sister
Might Live Several Days.

ILL WOMAN UNDER OPIATES

Physicians Tell Executive That His
Relative Will Not Again Be
Conscious and Urge That
He Leave Bedside.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Sept. 12.—President Wilson decided tonight to return to his summer home, Shadow Lawn, Long Branch, N. J., tomorrow morning. He was advised by physicians attending his sister, Mrs. Anne E. Howe, who is critically ill here and constantly under the influence of opiates, that she might linger in her present condition for several days.

The President, it was announced, plans to return here if there is a definite turn for the worse in Mrs. Howe's condition.

"The President expects to leave here on the yacht Mayflower. No definite date has been set for his departure. Mrs. Wilson will accompany him."

After a consultation with Dr. H. M. Lee, Dr. Edward P. Davis, of Philadelphia, tonight issued the following statement:

"Mrs. Howe's physicians have advised the President that she no longer will be able to recognize him clearly or comprehend his visits, as she must be kept almost constantly under the influence of opiates. While Mrs. Howe cannot recover, her life may continue for several days or more, and, in view of these facts and the urgent duties of the President, it is his intention to join Mrs. Howe's children at the earliest possible moment when the end of her illness comes. In her weak condition the visits of relatives and friends so excite her that from now on no one will be allowed to converse with her."

Soon before Dr. Davis gave out his statement, he and Dr. Lee joined in the following bulletin on Mrs. Howe's condition:

"Mrs. Howe has been comfortable today, but has fallen slightly during the last 24 hours."

The physicians added that it was better for the President to remember his sister as he saw her today, when she was conscious for a short time.

While on board the Mayflower, Secretary Lane discussed the result of yesterday's Maine elections briefly with the President. Later Secretary Lane said he was not at all disappointed over the returns. He added:

"It is normally a Republican state and the showing made by the Democratic candidates was excellent."

"All my information shows the President is very strong throughout the country and I have no doubt that he will be re-elected and that both the Senate and House will remain Democratic."

A. E. CLARK CASE AFFIRMED

Dismissal of Divorce Suit by Judge McGinn Upheld.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—The Supreme Court today affirmed the judgment of Circuit Judge McGinn, of Multnomah County, in dismissing the suit for divorce brought by Mrs. Margaret Clark, of Portland, against A. E. Clark. The decision was written by Justice Benson.

In his decision Justice Benson upheld the action of the lower court in sustaining the defendant's motion to strike the complaint from the files for want of verification.

MAINE POINTS WAY, AVERS MR. HUGHES

Election Results Declared to
Prove That Republican
Party Is Reunited.

CRITICISM NOT PERSONAL

Nominee in Assailing Administration
Points Out That Campaign Is
"Good Natured" and That
Open Truth Is Needed.

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Charles E. Hughes, in the last speech of his first Presidential campaign trip, asserted here tonight before a crowd that filled the opera-house that the result in Maine had proved the Republican party was reunited. He declared the party would not "change its plans or aims."

"Persons in the audience took the reference to apply to criticism of the methods pursued in conducting the present campaign and applauded the nominee vigorously."

"I come to you," Mr. Hughes said, "as the spokesman of a reunited Republican party. We have said it was reunited, we have devoutly hoped it was reunited. Now Maine proves that it is reunited. Whoever was skeptical about that before must hide his cynicism now. We shall abandon no efforts. We shall not change our plans or aims, but we shall go forward with renewed confidence, because the old state in the north-east corner has spoken in no uncertain way."

Wilson Administration Criticized.

He assailed the Wilson Administration for failure to reduce the cost of living, for extravagance, for failure to protect American lives and rights abroad and for failure "to live up to its promise to observe the merit system." The nominee emphasized previous declarations that the campaign was a "good-natured" one.

"It is time for assessment, for appraisal and for candid statement," he said. "No one in this country can object to full and fair discussion. That is the very spirit of our institution. I do not desire, in speaking of those who do not agree with me, to manifest the slightest disrespect. If the argument is sound it will carry with itself suggestion of personal enmity. We do not need that in our campaigns. What we need is fairness and truth and that is the electorate decide."

"Our friends on the other side said that the Republican party was responsible for the high cost of living. They have been in power for some time and I do not see that the high cost of living has been reduced. It was said they would dispose of many useless offices. The abolition of useless offices has not been quite so apparent as the appointment of useless officers."

Training Camp.

Earlier in the day the nominee visited the military training camp here, remaining for dinner with Major-General Leonard Wood. Mr. Hughes praised the camp in his speech.

"It is a training school in democracy," he said. "It is a discipline that knits men together in wholesome comradeship. It is preparedness, not only military, but civil and moral."

"That is the spirit we must have in this country if America is to go forward, if America indeed is to hold her place among the nations in the troublous days of the 20th century."

"I desire to see these camps maintained in various parts of our land, and men in constantly increasing numbers seeking the benefit of the training and discipline. I believe that our citizen reserve should be trained under Federal authority. I think it vigorously untimely to abandon the plan that was first formulated with that end in view."

Mr. Hughes left Plattsburg for New York tonight. He will remain here until tomorrow afternoon, when he will go to his summer home at Bridgehampton, where he will stay until September 17 or 18, when he starts his second campaign trip.

MR. HAWLEY IS SURPRISED

Clean Sweep in Maine Even Greater
Victory Than Was Expected.

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—Representative Hawley, of Oregon, on his way from Washington to Chicago today and conferred with officials in charge of Western headquarters of the Republican National Committee. He intended to show that the election over the result of the Maine election, saying that the Republican victory was more than he and the campaign managers had expected, in that it had been virtually conceded the Democrats would elect one Senator and one Representative.

The governor, considering the fact that the fight was made almost exclusively on National issues, he thinks, augurs well for the Republican party and still believes in the old saying that "as goes Maine, so goes the country."

Mr. Hawley, while here, urged the National Committee to send several good speakers to Oregon this fall. The committee has already arranged to send Senator Jones, of Washington; Senator Norris, of Nebraska, and Representative Kahn, of California, and is now completing schedules which will route other prominent speakers through the Pacific Coast states. Mr. Hawley told the National committee Oregon will roll up a large majority for Hughes, the only question being as to its size. Mr. Hawley left for Portland tonight.

Champ Clark Admits "Licking."

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 12.—(Special.)—Champ Clark, of Missouri, House, when asked to comment on the Maine election, replied: "We got hell licked out of us and that is about all there is to it."

RAILROAD EARNINGS GROW

Net Revenues for July, 1916, Exceed 1915 by \$93,415,264.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Net revenues from railway operations of \$85,415,264 for July, as against \$75,480,339 for July, 1915, for 150 railroads, were announced today by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The gross revenue for the roads reporting was \$265,517,824, or more than \$40,000,000 over a year ago. The gross operating revenue was \$172,102,460, or about \$21,000,000 more than a year ago.

ARMY CAMP IS WRECKED

Wind and Hail Play Havoc
Through Texas.

PRESIDIO, Tex., Sept. 12.—A heavy wind and hail storm wrecked the Army camp here today, numbers of tents being blown down and the roofs of the buildings being carried away. Minor damage also was reported throughout this vicinity.

Troop F, of the Sixth United States Cavalry, arrived from Indio, Tex., and relieved Troops F and M of the First Texas Cavalry, which left for Marfa.

Oil Dividend Declared.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 12.—The Washington Oil Company, one of the Standard Oil subsidiaries, today declared a dividend of \$4 a share, payable October 20, to stockholders of record September 20. This is the first dividend paid since December, 1914.

Ex-Judge of Baltimore Dead.

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 12.—Judge John Upshur Dennis, 70 years old, for many years member of the Supreme bench of Baltimore City, died tonight. He was named for the Supreme bench in 1887 and was retired in 1908 on account of physical incapacity, having suffered a stroke of paralysis.

and imposed sentence.

Foules lost \$11,312 and two farms
worth \$40,000 in Madras, Ind., to
Miss Miller. After she jilted him,
Foules testified, she gave him a
Bible and told him to go to California
and marry a rich widow.

GIRL, 15, ACCUSES PRIEST

Girl Refuses to Speak Name, but
Writes It on Paper.

FRESNO, Cal., Sept. 12.—Father
Thomas King, pastor of St. Mary's
Catholic Church in Madras, was placed
under arrest today in Madras on a
charge of assaulting Margaret Haley,
15-year-old stepdaughter of Peter Car-
doza, who was arrested and received here.
Cardoza was originally arrested on the
charge but later released.

The Haley girl recently became a
mother. She refused to speak the name
of her assailant, according to state-
ment of the District Attorney, but
wrote Father King's name on a sheet
of paper.
