 County Assessor, will be chairman of
 the day. Mr. De Bruin, well-known
 baritone, formerly with the San Fran-
 cisco Opera Company, will sing accom-
 panied by his teacher, Harold Hurlbut.
 After the luncheon the club members
 will depart in autos to the Multnomah
 County Fair at Gresham.

BATTALIO BABY BETTER. — According
 to Dr. David N. Moberg, secretary of
 the State Board of Health, the infant
 talio baby, suffering from infantile
 paralysis, will be paralyzed in the left
 arm. He predicts recovery of the child,
 which is better. Portland's only case
 of infantile paralysis during the pres-
 ent year has been watched with ex-
 treme vigilance. Dr. Moberg said yes-
 terday that its parents were rather
 averse to having so much attention
 paid them. A policeman is kept day
 and night guarding the place at 448
 East Ninth street, where the baby is
 quarantined, so that all danger of an
 epidemic may be eliminated.

CHARLES H. BARNETT DEAD. —
 Word reached this city yesterday of
 the death at Lees, Wash., of Charles
 H. Barnett, a resident of Portland for
 the past 11 years. Mr. Barnett left
 here nearly a month ago to pay a
 visit to his son and soon after his ar-
 rival there was taken sick. He was
 born at Rochester, N. Y., was 58 years
 old and for many years was a railroad
 engineer, residing for some time at La-
 grande. Besides his widow he leaves a
 son, Warren K. Barnett, of San Fran-
 cisco, and Miss Selena Barnett, of 715
 Overton street. The body is being
 brought to Portland.

ATTORNEY HAS TO PAY CLAIM. — A
 jury in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's
 court gave a verdict for \$138 yester-
 day to T. M. Morris in the suit against
 T. B. McDevitt, Jr. The case was on
 appeal from the District Court. The
 money involved in the suit was origi-
 nally the property of Harvey P.
 Stewart, who was arrested May 10,
 1914, and sent to jail on a charge of
 larceny. Mr. McDevitt got possession
 of the money, declaring it to be part
 of his agreement for attorney's fees
 for defending Stewart. This was denied
 by Mr. Morris who said the right to
 the money had been transferred to him
 by Stewart.

INJURED LAWYER SUES. — While Elmer
 Swanson was employed by Hans Ped-
 erson in sawing timbers for use in the
 construction of the Auditorium build-
 ing one of the timbers flew and struck
 him in the left eye, according to allega-
 tions in a suit filed yesterday. Swans-
 on asks damages in the sum of \$2500.
 The complaint alleges that Swanson
 was knocked unconscious by the blow
 and that the sight of his eye was im-
 paired. He also says he received per-
 manent injury to his nerve to the
 failure of Pederson, the contractor,
 to have proper safeguards for the saw
 is charged.

TWOY BROS. SUE FOR \$7500. — Martin
 F. Jones, laborer, was killed by a
 dozer propelled by a locomotive at
 Pilot Rock Junction in Multnomah County
 August 29, 1915. E. W. Howard, a
 manager of the Jones estate, filed
 suit in the Circuit Court yesterday for
 \$7500, naming Twoy Bros. as defend-
 ants. Jones was employed by Twoy
 Bros. in some construction work at the
 time of the accident, according to the
 complaint. He was shoveling dirt onto
 a temporary railroad track when the
 locomotive propelling the dozer struck
 him and he was killed.

JOSEPH SEALY IS DEAD. — Neagle P.
 Sealy, of the George S. Sealy Company,
 has received a cable message from New
 Zealand announcing the death of his
 father, Joseph Sealy, of Timaru, N. Z.
 The late Mr. Sealy was brother of
 John and Francis Sealy, of Sealy,
 Dresser Company, of Portland. His
 two daughters, Misses Ellen and Josie
 Sealy, will come to this city to
 meet their home with their brother.
 In 1913 Francis and John Sealy went
 to New Zealand where they visited
 their brothers, Joseph and Tom, whom
 they had not seen for 45 years.

CELESTION FUNERAL TODAY. — The
 funeral of Ivan Gustafson, who was
 drowned in the Clackamas River Sun-
 day while fishing with Fred Wahlgren,
 and whose body was found yesterday
 after a prolonged search, will be held
 from the family residence, 1248 Mary-
 land avenue, this afternoon at 2 o'clock.
 Rev. George E. Peterson will officiate
 at the ceremonies. Interment will be
 in Riverview Cemetery. Mr. Gustafson
 was an employee of Lipman, Wolfe &
 Co., fellow employees from the store
 will act as pallbearers.

RAILROADS SUE FOR \$10,430. — Damages
 for personal injuries in the sum of
 \$10,430 are demanded by Gertie Daniel-
 son in a suit started in the Circuit
 Court yesterday against the Pullman
 Company, the Western Electric and
 Terminal Company and the O. W. R. &
 Co. She alleges that she was seriously
 and permanently injured when a loco-
 motive of the Pullman company struck
 a Pullman car standing on the O. W. R.
 & N. tracks here on March 18, 1916,
 while she was engaged in cleaning the
 car.

MAN CRANKING AUTO INJURED. — While
 cranking the automobile he was about
 to drive yesterday morning, Mike
 Melendthal, of Estacada, was severely
 injured. The engine apparently back-
 fired and Mr. Melendthal sustained a
 fractured thigh and laceration about the
 leg. The accident happened at Estacada.
 Mr. Melendthal was brought to
 Good Samaritan Hospital for treatment.

MRS. TODD SUFFERS STILL. — Mrs. An-
 drew Todd, who fell and injured her
 shoulder three weeks ago, is still suf-
 fering considerably from nervous pro-
 stration and paralysis, as well as other
 complications. She is being cared for
 at the home of her daughter, Mrs.
 Harry Jones, 715 Ninth street, Oregon
 City.

ANOTHER LINTON ERROR RISES. —
 Added to the other grief Portland has
 had since Linton and the Linton Hill
 side boulevard were annexed has come
 now the problem of obtaining a right
 of way for the boulevard through a
 tract of land owned by Mrs. P. J. Mann.
 It has been found that the right of way
 through this property never was ob-
 tained. Mrs. Mann has agreed to grant
 a right of way through her property
 for \$1000 and it looks as if there was
 nothing left for the Council to do but
 appropriate the money from the gen-
 eral fund. It has been estimated that
 the right of way took 15 acres of the
 Mann property.

DR. BISHOP MAY ACCEPT. — Dr. Arthur
 Bishop, of Austin, Tex., who has re-
 ceived a call to become pastor of the
 Central Presbyterian Church, has not
 given his answer, but it is thought that
 he may accept the call. He told the
 congregation Sunday that he was de-
 lighted with the treatment the people
 of the Central Church had given him
 while he had been in Portland. He
 told of the trip up the Columbia River
 Highway, which he declared was not
 equalled anywhere in the west. He
 was also taken up the Willamette
 River to the Falls, where he experi-
 enced the thrills of catching a big
 salmon.

MOTORIST SUE FOR \$10,000. — Dam-
 ages for personal injuries in the sum
 of \$10,000 is asked in a suit filed in
 the Circuit Court yesterday for Isadore
 Jacobson, a minor, by Sam Jacobson,
 his guardian. S. M. Schneiderman is
 made the defendant in the case. Mr.
 Schneiderman is charged in the com-
 plaint with having made a sharp turn
 around to the left with his automobile
 at the intersection of Second and Sher-
 man streets and thus injuring Isadore
 Jacobson. The boy is said to have sus-
 tained two fractured ribs and internal
 injuries as a result of the accident.

CHARGE IS MADE. — The original
 against R. C. Turner, insurance ad-
 juster, charging larceny by bailee, was
 dismissed by Circuit Judge Davis on
 the recommendation of Deputy District
 Attorney Hindman. Mr. Hindman re-
 presented to the court that the claim
 against Turner made by C. L. Boss &
 Co. had been satisfied. The original
 charge was that Turner has taken an
 automobile belonging to Boss & Co.,
 which was not paid for. He was located
 in Helena and extradited. He was in-
 dicted on June 3 on the charge of
 larceny by bailee.

FOOD STANDARDS TO BE TOPIC. — Co-
 operation between the Consumers'
 League and the bureau of the Chamber
 of Commerce, is planned to determine
 better standards of pure food produc-
 tion in the manufacturing concerns of
 the state. A conference has been set
 for September 26, between the com-
 mittee of the Consumers' League and
 the food products division of the
 bureau at which this programme will
 be fully discussed.

PROXY FUNERAL INDEFINITE. — The

 be held here this week. The funeral
 services are delayed pending the ar-

 Finley's undertaking establishment. It
 is probable that the body will be
 cremated here. Mr. Prouty left no
 relatives here.

BROADWAY WORK DONE. — The Broad-
 way grade lowering and paving project

 project. Traffic was admitted on

 the bridge Sunday, but the paving of
 Williams avenue where it joins Broad-
 way was income from the project in-
 volved an expenditure of \$45,000.

Rapid Turn-overs One Answer to Rising Costs

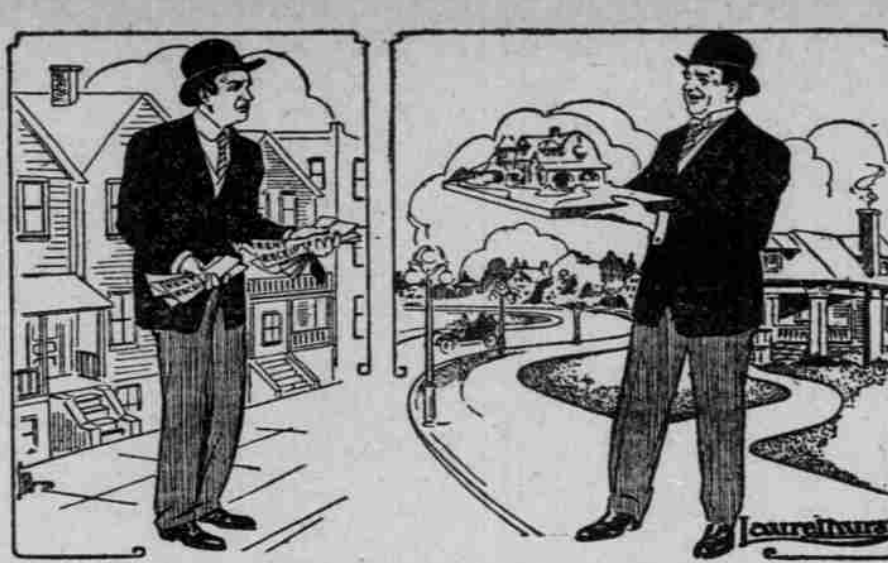
By turning its capital three times a year at 7 per cent net, a business makes more money than by turning its capital twice at 10 per cent net.

MORE RESTRAINT FAVORED
 City May Limit Stops for Autos to 15 Minutes.

Restriction of all vehicles to 15-minute stops in the business district may be the City Council's means of overcoming objections of merchants to the new traffic ordinance, which would allow taxicabs and for hire automobiles to stand for an unlimited time in the greater part of the business district. The question will be before the Council today.

The new traffic ordinance provides that if the driver remains in the automobile he shall not be subject to the rule which limits the stop to 30 minutes during the daytime. Merchants have raised a vigorous protest against this provision owing to the fact that it would open the way for abuses by the taxicab and for hire car drivers. It is argued that they will stand in front of a place for hours with no means of the owner of the premises forcing them to move.

Mayor Albee is the proponent of the change in the measure which would limit stops to 15 minutes throughout the business district except on streets

where stopping should not be permitted at all.
