

TEUTONS DRAW IN LINES IN DOBRUDJA

Pressure on the Roumanians in Transylvania, However, Continues Unabated.

FIERCE FIGHTING REPORTED

London Admits Roumanian Second Army Will Need Help—Austro-Germans Are Well Below Highest Level of Pass.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—A wireless message from Petrograd today says that the Teutonic lines in Dobruja have been withdrawn to the vicinity of Dobrich (Bazardjik), in the southern portion of the province.

The situation on the Roumanian frontier occupies the leading position on the news and editorial pages of the London newspapers. The Roumanians, according to official reports, have been forced back six or seven miles at one point in their own country.

The Times says: "The enemy has advanced into Rourmelia through the Torzburger Pass, and the Roumanians are fighting on their own soil at Rucaru. Apparently they have temporarily lost possession of all but the southern approaches of Torzburger Pass."

SERBIAN CONSPIRATOR DIES

Man Implicated in Archduke's Assassination Passes in Prison.

BERLIN, Oct. 16.—(By wireless to Skyville, N. Y.)—Nedjo Kerovic, one of the conspirators in the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, his apparent partner in the Austrian throne, in 1914, has died in a military prison, says a report from Sarajevo, Bosnia, given out by the Overseas News Agency.

Three of the conspirators in the assassination of the archduke were executed in February, 1915, and Jakov Zilovic and Nedjo Kerovic were sentenced to life imprisonment, but it was later commuted to 20 years.

OFFICIAL WAR REPORTS

British. LONDON, Oct. 16.—The text of today's official statement is: "Heavy hostile shelling continued at intervals during the night on our front south of the Ancre. A sudden hostile bombing attack on our trenches north of Courcellette was driven back without difficulty.

"At Schwaben a more important enemy attack, delivered after heavy artillery preparation and assisted by flames, also was repulsed with heavy loss to the enemy.

"During the night, the enemy's trenches were successfully entered by the trenches of the Ancre, southeast of St. Flloi and east of Ploegsteert. A number of the enemy were killed and prisoners were taken.

"The communication from British headquarters in France issued tonight reads: The situation on the Roumanian front is as follows. On the night of the 13th and 14th, the enemy last night in attack upon our positions at Schwaben redoubt were exceedingly heavy. Sixty-eight prisoners, including one officer, were left in our hands. Our loss were very slight.

"In the neighborhood of Neuville-St. Vaast, our heavy artillery and field guns carried out an organized bombardment on the enemy's lines. Good results were obtained. "Much successful work was carried out by our aeroplanes yesterday in conjunction with our artillery. One hostile battery position was completely destroyed and many others were severely damaged. Bombs were dropped on an enemy railway station and on transports moving behind the enemy's lines with excellent effect."

British in Macedonia. LONDON, Oct. 16.—British forces on the Struma front in Macedonia are active on the left flank of their line of the river, and have pushed their outposts further northeast in the direction of Demir-Hissar, according to today's official announcement of the operations of the British army. The village of Bursuk, eight miles southwest of Demir-Hissar, has been entered by the British patrols, who drove back Bulgarian detachments. The statement follows: "On the Struma, our patrols have penetrated Bursuk and driven back enemy detachments."

"A successful bombing attack on the Buk bridge was carried out by the Royal Naval Air Service, which has been successful. "On the Dolran front, there is no change in the situation."

Russian. PETROGRAD, via London, Oct. 16.—Heavy forces of Teutonic troops have been driven back in a fierce encounter in the other passes the enemy is making no progress but until the latest official reports, and at one point at least King Ferdinand's forces have been driven back well within their own territory.

SECURITY STAYS IN SHERIDAN CASE

One Judge in United States Court of Appeals Dissents From Confirmation.

BANKER IS 70 YEARS OLD

Announcement Made From Roseburg That Petition Circulated Year Ago Will Be Forwarded to President Next Week.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals affirmed today the five-year penitentiary sentence of Thomas R. Sheridan, former president of the First National Bank of Roseburg, Ore., who was convicted of misappropriating funds in violation of the National bank act.

Judge Erskine M. Rose wrote a dissenting opinion upholding the plea of the former bank president that consent of depositors to his substitution of personal notes for their deposits lessened the taking of the money. Mr. Sheridan, it was charged, used about \$50,000 obtained in this way.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 16.—(Special.)—Roseburg attorneys who have befriended T. R. Sheridan, former president of the First National Bank of this city, since he was indicted by the Federal grand jury in Portland more than two years ago, declared today that an effort would be made to have him pardoned by the President of the United States.

A petition for a pardon for Mr. Sheridan was circulated throughout the state about a year ago and it is said to contain the names of a majority of the jurors who heard the evidence. The judges who presided at the trial, several of the prosecuting officers and thousands of citizens of this city and elsewhere, signed the petition. This petition will be sent to Washington next week, according to announcement made here today.

PAPER MATERIAL FOUND

WASTE FROM HEMP FIBRE FACTORY FOUND SATISFACTORY FOR PULP.

Quantity at Present Not Sufficient, However, to Warrant Construction of Mill for Special Purpose.
