

PRESIDENT CLOSES NEW YORK CAMPAIGN

Torchlight Parade, Headed by Tammany Hosts, Advances on Madison Square.

GREAT CROWD TURNS OUT

Listeners Told "Party of People" Is Being Built Up—In Address to Business Men He Pleads for Co-operation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—With two great rallies here tonight President Wilson closed his campaign election except for a speech he will deliver to New Jersey friends and neighbors at Shadow Lawn Saturday.

Crowd Cheers 30 Minutes. Augustus Thomas president at the Madison Square meeting. The first speaker was Samuel Seabury, candidate for Governor of New York.

Country Declared Divided. The President said the campaign in 1912 represented a fight against privilege, and that the country was divided.

Police Obligated to Use Clubs. President Wilson, in two addresses at Cooper Union—inside the large meeting hall and another to a crowd, which filled the square and streets adjacent to the reception grounds.

Young Men Told to "Get Ready." "A free nation," said the President, "cannot have the spirit of employees; it's got to have the spirit of comrades and equals, or it will not go forward."

Business Declared Feared. "I have been told again and again that it was a mistake for me not to come into country in public affairs here, men who constitute what we have agreed to call 'Wall Street'."

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FRAUD PLAN SHOWN

Connors Says Logan Taught Him How to Get Cash.

SOME VICTIMS INSISTENT

Iowans, Witness in Land Case Testifies, Were Pacified by Suggestion That They Could Get Their Money Back.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—Daniel J. Connors, of Seattle, who pleaded guilty to an indictment charging use of the mails to defraud in connection with the so-called Oregon-California land fraud cases, and who served 13 months in the Federal penitentiary at McNeil's Island for his offense, was placed on the witness stand today in the second trial of Norman D. Cook, W. A. Nicholson, A. J. Reetz, W. B. DeGarmo, Sidney L. Sperry and Franklin P. Bull, in the United States District Court here.

Connors was serving his sentence when the first trial of the defendants now on trial was held and was not a Government witness. Since his release from McNeil's Island he has been paroled by President Wilson.

Convincing Methods Learned. Connors started filing claims for people in the Northwest in February, 1913, he told the jury today. He learned of the "scheme" while working as a stenographer in the office of H. G. Lake, in Seattle, he said. He told the jury today that he was associated with John W. Logan, said by the prosecution to have been the architect of the scheme.

One Applicant Turns Tables. Once he held the jury, he and Logan were victimized, one applicant tendering a check for \$25 and not having funds in the bank to meet it.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—"I kept my mouth shut and saved Herman Rossi's neck. I trampled on my pride and dignity. I saw myself in the gutter. I gave \$17,000 to aid in his defense. And now, despite the fact that Herman Rossi is worth nearly \$200,000, he would throw me out and take my money."

Green, of Grants Pass, who was \$7 over the Dougan bid.
