

WOMAN SUFFRAGE MEASURES EXPRESSED BY WORKERS

Both Sides of Public Questions Are Espoused by Correspondents in City and Country, Throughout All Sections of State.

RESPECTS PAID LAND BILL

W. D. Fenton Declares Measure Is Most Dangerous.

PORTLAND, Nov. 5.—(To the Editor.)—In my judgment there is no proposed measure to be voted on November 8 so dangerous and so destructive of all values and all property in Oregon as the "Full Rental Value Land Tax and Homemaker's Loan Fund Amendment."

Disguised under some "new" name, this measure, if adopted, will confiscate private property to the state and make every landowner, whether in town, city or country, a tenant of the state. It proposes to take from every owner of real estate, in the form of pretended taxes, the "rental value" of such real estate. All the state taxes must be raised therefrom, and in addition hereto two-thirds of the full rental value land tax levied upon real estate in each county must be divided among the different towns, cities, ports and all other municipalities in the county and the state, apportioned upon the basis of the general tax levy for 1915.

As a woman suffrage body, let us form a solid front, unfurl our banners and proclaim "justice to all, malice to none." Let us adopt some such measure, "is to help persons with no capital but their labor and character to make homes and farms."

Special taxes on personal property and land improvement may be levied each year for local purposes, for school and district purposes, for all other municipalities, proposed by initiative, petitions, voted upon each year in November. The depletion of the fund raised by the full rental value land tax will be supplied by this annual levy of special taxes upon personal property and land improvement, and made the duty of the state to bid the land of any delinquent land tax, and when title is vested in the state under any delinquent tax and when the land is sold to sell any land. Of course, under this system the state will ultimately acquire title to all real estate in the state, and when it is absolutely bankrupt, and the communities, towns, rural and school districts would be compelled to rely solely upon legal taxes levied annually upon the people, for revenues to maintain schools, construct and maintain roads, and for other municipal purposes.

The annual full rental value land tax is to be fixed by the county assessor and tax commission, and the apportionment of the land tax board and there is no time fixed when any aggrieved land owner can be heard as to his assessment. The assessor has no authority to be heard, nor any provision for review of this action.

No such radical or revolutionary measure has ever been proposed in any county in the United States, and in any country. The measure is a violation to the measure may be succinctly stated as follows:

1. It proposes to levy taxes upon all real estate to its full rental value, and take one-third thereof and lend it to people without any capital except their credit, and the remainder to be used for the benefit of the state for five years. It is proposed to use the taxes paid by the owner of land to make loans to those who do not have any capital, and to security, and to lend it for five years without interest. In effect it proposes to tax the land, and the pockets of every farmer, home owner and land owner and put it into the pockets of the man who has no property and can do no security, and who is a victim of legal robbery in the boldest possible way.

AGAINST ANY POSSIBLE BURDEN

If we adopt the rural credits amendment we shall have taken the first step toward abolishing the many such systems of wholesale land confiscation as would be established by the adoption of the Full Rental Value Land Tax. Home Owners Loan Fund amendment, which appears on the official ballot as Nos. 306 and 307. This is a single tax in the most radical form which has ever been drafted into a law. Most of the men who are behind it are earnest men and serious, but they are not looking upon it as the only means of wiping out our state disgrace of idle lands and idle landless men.
