

OPTIMISM ON VOTE ADVISED BY PASTOR

Voters' League of Young Men
to Present Good Measures
Urged by Dr. Boyd.

POLITICS IS DISCUSSED

Many Regard Hesitancy and Re-
luctance of Administration as
Contemptible, Says Minister
in Sermon on Politics.

Optimism over the results of the recent election, even though the minds of many the hesitancy and reluctance of the Administration is unworthy of a great people," was advocated by Dr. John H. Boyd in his sermon, "Shall We Be Optimists or Pessimists," delivered at the First Presbyterian Church yesterday morning.

Dr. Boyd spoke plainly. When he referred to the "hesitancy and reluctance" of the Administration as "unworthy of a great people," he added: "Contemptible—contemptible—I use the word."

He declared the voters were sincere in "looking for something better as earnestly that they did not want to be dictated to by oppressive forces or any forces not worthy of being regarded." Plainly he implied the controversy which centered around the passage of the Adamson law.

Credit Given Women Voters.
"It may be," he said, "that in the councils of the Almighty these things represent the beginnings of a new departure which shall end warfare and relate our common humanity into brotherhood of universal fellowship and peace." In this connection he said the entry of women into politics had quickened the conscience of the voters.

Dr. Boyd pleaded for an optimism such as Christ had, an optimism which would overcome any disappointment at the results of the election, or gloom caused by the present war in Europe. He also urged the need for a voters' league formed of young men wholly absorbed from partisanship, who would make it their duty to present to the public measures without prejudice and tell the truth about the positions and characters of candidates. This, he said, would make for the election of the right kind of candidates and the passage of measures for the benefit of the public.

"There is no question that our citizenship is endeavoring to vote conscientiously for good men and right measures," he said. "One further step to obtain the best results must yet be taken. They must be educated into an intelligent understanding of measures and must be able to discover the truth concerning men."

Misrepresentation Is Charged.
"At present our campaigns are a welter of misrepresentation, and partisanship discolors until the voter is confused and those who do not do the best with his ballot, he is misled into error which brings weakness and disaster into our political life."

Dr. Boyd declared that no matter what happened, God was working out his will.
"The world lies bleeding under the iron heel of war," he said.
"The expectations and fond hopes of multitudes have been disappointed in the outcome of the election. A man should remember at an hour like this that the Divine Will is upon the field; that the world is not guided by the will of kings, the ambitions of nations, party platforms, or blind gropings of multitudes, but God is working out his will. No man can understand the moral law of the American people is striking out his will. He is larger and better than either party represents. The surprise, the shifting maelstrom of instability, the indication that the great American people is believing and seeking something different from the other nations of the world. The anti-militarism, the slow, steady resistance to foreign aggression, reveals an unwillingness to use the reeking tube and iron sword which have desolated the centuries with war."

Moral Earnestness Indicated.
Dr. Boyd declared that the results of the election show a moral earnestness which is determined to strike at evil, and to enlist every resource and help for the great task of raising up a larger civilization.

"The state has been interpreted in terms of business," he said. "Its function is to obtain and maintain prosperity. But prosperity has been with us and corruption in high circles and violence in the world of labor have been features of that era. Our citizenship is demanding that the moral law of life shall be recognized and a way be found into new conditions upon which may be built a large future."

Dr. Boyd said that the confidence that Jesus had in the confidence which should encourage every man at the present hour.

"One man," he said, "is incurably optimistic, and disregarding the dark, tragic elements of things as they actually are, lives upon the surface, where he maintains his quietude and smiles. Another rises in rebellion against life. He becomes fierce, hating and wishes to destroy. Another, in the face of failure, develops a spirit of individual strength and wins an inner victory."

But, seeing in the world the outworking of a divine purpose, he trusted that God somehow, out of pain and sin, would work his loving purpose."

"Jesus trusted men, believed in his ability to recover himself and rise to higher things. He was the first great spirit of the world who wrote democracy into his creed. He believed in the power of the common people, which resided in his own words, in the ideals of his life and in the powers of the cross. And, therefore, he uttered his bold, brave call of courage to humanity."

BELGIANS DRIVEN OUT

GERMAN DEPORTATIONS DEFENDED ON ECONOMIC GROUNDS.

Cologne Newspaper Says Measures Are Dictated Solely by Considerations of Safe Police Administration.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 12.—(Via London, Nov. 12.) The Koelsche Volkszeitung publishes a long article on the subject of Germany's deportation of Belgian workmen, in which it says: "The measures are dictated solely by considerations of a safe police administration which could not allow thousands of alien-bodied workers to go to ruin by remaining deliberately unemployed and spending their time unprofitably in cafes. Germany's action is the result of humanitarianism, which would justify even the use of coercion in the circumstances."

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Special dispatches from Rotterdam say that the deportation of Belgians continues daily on a large scale. Antwerp and Ghent, the dispatches say, are being slowly denuded of able-bodied males. Sixteen thousand have already left Ghent.

The men deported from Ghent have been almost exclusively of the unemployed class, but elsewhere the dispatches say, and especially in Antwerp, there has been less discrimination. It is said that the deportations from Brussels will begin in the 15th.

According to stories current in Holland, say the dispatches, in the "raided" towns many men were pounced upon suddenly and escorted away by armed guards and not permitted to communicate with friends. Harbors of men who were to be deported were severely punished. Wire barriers and machine guns are placed around the stations where men are to be entrained lest the crowds make trouble.

ROWANMORE REPORT IN

GERMAN SUBMARINE SAYS VESSEL ATTEMPTED FLIGHT.

Account of Sinking of Marina Expected Soon—Three Other Cases of Sinking of Ships Submitted.

BERLIN, Nov. 11.—(Via wireless to the Associated Press, via Sayville, N. Y., Nov. 12.)—The official report of the command of the German submarine, which sank the British steamer Rowanmore, on which there were several Americans, says the Rowanmore was sunk by a torpedo fired from the submarine. The report also says that the submarine fired a few shots in order to bring her to.

Three other cases of the sinking of steamships have been submitted by the German command to the Foreign Office. The vessels were destroyed in September. No evidence was presented in this connection to indicate that Germany was in violation of the laws of war.

Affidavits obtained by the American Consul at Liverpool said the Rowanmore was sunk by a torpedo fired from a submarine. The American survivors said under oath that the vessel was torpedoed without warning.

SUBMARINE NEVER SEEN

ARABIA'S PASSENGERS, HOWEVER, SURE OF TORPEDO.

Periscope Observed by One Man, But Presence of Rescuers May Have Prevented Later Visit.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Malta dealing with the sinking of the liner Arabia says: "Passengers of the Arabia who landed here say that the submarine was not seen, but that the wake of a torpedo was discerned. After the ship was sunk, the submarine's periscope was seen 200 yards distant."

"The torpedo struck the bunker near the engine-room. Coal blocked the rent and stemmed the influx of water, which undoubtedly enabled the Arabia to remain so long afloat. The crash was terrific and the vessel swirled round under the force of the impact. Two engineers are missing and it is supposed they perished at their post of duty. The periscope was distinctly seen circling around the vessel after she was struck, but the submarine never came to the surface."

"The passengers are convinced that the gravest disaster was only averted by the presence of mind of the European crew, to whom had been allotted the water-tight doors. Dr. Bodie, a passenger, relates that while he was in a boat he saw the periscope moving about the Arabia, the intention of the submarine evidently being to board the steamer and secure the ship's papers. The rescuing vessels, however, frustrated this design."

FEDERAL ATTORNEY DEAD

John A. Aylward, of Wisconsin, Stricken Suddenly in Bed.

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 12.—John A. Aylward, United States District Attorney for the Western District of Wisconsin, was found dead in bed today. He was 52 years old. Death resulted from a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mr. Aylward had been defeated twice as the Democratic candidate for Governor of the state, and was the law partner of Joseph E. Davies, of the Federal Trade Commission.

The name of Edgar Selwyn, author, on the program at the Baker Theatre this week, reviving pleasant memories of a delicately-pointed comedy in which, of his plays, still gives an audience no inkling of the joyous characters in the farce, "Nearly Married."

That is one of the delights of the plays Selwyn wrote. He has fashioned a highly amusing farce out of the adventures of a divorced wife who, only to find they cannot be married because of some technicality. For three acts they are "nearly married" and that's where the farce gets its name. The comedy is rich, and there's a laugh in every line, there are unique characters, one or two amusing lines, and it moves with a rapidity of action that shows the fine handiwork of Walter Gilbert, stage director.

Action Doesn't Lag.
If there's one thing that can make a farce a very sad mess, it is to have its action lag. The Alcazar players do not commit any such error. They race through its fun much as if it meant great fun for them, too. The players cope delightfully with the unconventional situations which the exigencies of the farce cast them, and the crisp, keen dialogue they interpret with sparkling humor.

The farce is for the main part concerned with the efforts of the more-or-less unhappy pair to re-marry, and the equally earnest efforts of the most-wife's brother to prevent the wedding. The author utilizes an element of the element of circumstantial evidence as the basis for the plot.

There's a girl divorce specialist, who has helped secure evidence in the divorce, and who later appears at every turn of the plot to furnish more trouble for some one. There are enough minor complications in that one piece to make a dozen plays.

McGovern Is Excellent.
Albert McGovern gives an excellent performance of the almost husband, who with his wife's sympathy, insurance, and giving the unhappy wife the exact shading so necessary to the development of the character.

Legislative Programme Forecast.

Whatever happens Republicans cannot control legislation in the next Congress because the Senate will be Democratic by a safe working majority of 12. Important legislation, which is to be pushed as soon as Congress convenes in December, includes immigration reform, a corrupt practices law further to limit political campaign expenditures, conservation of waterpower legislation, revision of the laws affecting railroads, a vocational educational law, a law to permit organization of collective selling agencies in foreign countries and further measures to perfect the National defense.

Sunday's War Moves.

THE Russians and Roumanians are vigorously on the offensive. North of the Constanta-Tchernavoda railway, the Russo-Roumanian forces have pushed back Field-Marshal von Mackensen's men to Parisa, a village through the towns of Topal, Inanceanu and Karanassut.

In the Transylvania zone the Russians have gradually reinforced the Roumanian line in the northern sector of the line until they are now fighting side by side with them over a front of 50 miles south of the Bukovina border. Official communications report the capture of Austro-German positions in the Trotus and Alt Vaila. The Ottava, the Austro-Germans have made advances, according to Berlin.

Sallisel, east of the Peronne-Bapaume road in the Somme region, has fallen entirely into the hands of the troops of General Foch. The French inflicted heavy casualties on the Germans.

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WILD MAN CAUGHT

Sandy Deputy Trails Denizen of Hills to Hood Slopes.

INSANITY IS APPARENT

Camp Fire Gives Clue to Whereabouts and Capture Results.

Ragged Garb Indicates Long Period in Fastnesses.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 12.—(Special.) After trailing a wild man through the heavily forested slopes of Mount Hood for the greater part of two days, a posse of 10 men, headed by Deputy Sheriff Deaton, of Sandy, this afternoon succeeded in making the capture. He was brought to Oregon City tonight and turned over to Sheriff Wilson. He will probably be examined for his sanity tomorrow and committed to the State Hospital for the insane.

The man is an Italian, about 35 years old. He speaks a little English, German and Italian, but the officials were unable to learn his name. He has been living in the Bull Run Lake neighborhood, one of the roughest sections of the country. Saturday morning he broke into the ranger station near the foot of the mountain and stole a quantity of food. Deputy Sheriff Deaton at Sandy was notified and by nightfall was able to locate the man's campfire near the Little Sandy River. Owing, however, to the rough nature of the country, the posse of mountaineers decided to wait until this morning before closing in on him. Early this morning they renewed the chase, but by the time they reached the site of the campfire the wild man had broken camp. His pursuers estimated that he had an hour's start on them.

In true Indian style they took up the trail. A footprint in the soft ground here, a broken limb there, told of the progress he had taken. He was located at the Little Sandy and this afternoon his followers located him. He was taken into custody without a struggle. The man's clothes were in shreds. Local authorities believe that he has been living on roots, berries and what he could steal from Summer campers. He has probably been living in the wilderness in the heart of the Cascades for several months in the most approved Joe Knowles fashion.

CHANGE IN ATTITUDE SEEN

Berlin Thinks Mr. Wilson's Views Are Becoming More Unbiased.

BERLIN, via London, Nov. 12.—President Wilson's attitude toward the warring nations of Europe is gradually changing, according to the Frankfurter Zeitung, which, in discussing Mr. Wilson's re-election, says: "How does it happen that large circles of American people, including women voters, prefer Wilson to Hughes for sentimental reasons? Because they assume his ambition remains to keep the Republic out of the gigantic conflict of the other great powers. What ever one says about the vitality of pacifist ideals we will commit grave error in underestimating their power over the American Nation. Charles von Bethmann-Hollweg would probably shrink from being regarded as a sentimental dreamer, yet he unequivocally proclaims the goal of humanity to be 'agreements and understanding,' that contrasts very strikingly with the rude words with which former Premier Clemenceau, of France, ridiculed Wilson as 'this more than fantastic orator.'"

"President Wilson has first to ascertain how the entire stands towards his plans. Only then can he expect that Germany, which certainly has not been coddled by him, will occupy itself with his ideas."
