

CARPENTER LIKELY TO BOX GOTHAM

Willard or Darcy Probable Opponent of French Champion Pugilist.

WAR RELIEF TO BENEFIT

Soldier Idol to Come to America Under Special Permit—Tex Rickard Offers Big Purse to Guarantee Match.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Tentative arrangements for the appearance of Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, in a local boxing arena for the benefit of a French war relief fund, are expected to be completed within the next 48 hours.

Both Carpentier and Willard have given their verbal consent to the proposals of the promoter, who has conducted his negotiations with the French champion through the American Fund for French Wounded, one of the many allied war relief organizations in this country.

Leave Granted Carpentier. It was necessary to obtain the assistance of this association if Carpentier was to get a furlough from the French army, with which he has been fighting since the beginning of the war.

It is understood by those most interested in the proposed contest that the French army authorities have agreed to give Carpentier the desired leave of absence in view of the fact that the boxer expressed complete willingness to donate his share of the purse to the relief fund.

Contracts between Carpentier, the officers of the American Fund for French Wounded and Promoter Rickard have been drawn up in triplicate and one of these is thought to have arrived in Paris today for the signature of the French pugilist. The contract, which stipulates that Carpentier shall meet any white boxer selected by Rickard, calls for the payment of \$25,000 to the American Fund for French Wounded; \$20,000 to the American Fund for French Wounded; \$10,000 for his traveling expenses, and a like amount for his share of the moving picture receipts. The fund is to receive approximately one-third of the moving picture proceeds and a certain percentage of the gate receipts should they exceed a given figure.

Opponent Not Selected. Just as soon as Carpentier's appearance is assured, Rickard will complete arrangements for signing a suitable opponent for the French champion.

In case Willard's terms are too high, Rickard will endeavor to sign up Len Darcy, the Australian middleweight, to meet Carpentier. Darcy is understood to be on his way to this country by way of South America and has notified his friends that he expects to arrive here about January 15.

Rickard has said that if Darcy is not available, he will endeavor to sign up the lean heavyweights who would request an opportunity to meet Carpentier.

Willard recently called Rickard to Chicago for the purpose of discussing the proposed bout with Carpentier, but his terms at that time were understood to have been approximately \$100,000, it is said, however, that the champion has since reduced his terms to about the same amount he received for meeting Frank Moran last March, which was \$47,500.

Willard, should the pugilist meet, will outweight his opponent by 100 pounds and will tower fully six inches above his French opponent.

DARCY IN CHILE, SAYS CHIP Pugilist Beaten by Australian Says Fighter Will Arrive Soon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5.—Les Darcy, the Australian fighter, left Sydney, N. S. W., October 31, on a steamer to the American steamer Hattie Luckenbach, according to George Chip, the Pennsylvania middleweight, who arrived here today from Australia on the liner Sierra.

Darcy got a decision over Chip during the latter's stay in Antipodes, and, Chip said today, he won because he was the better man.

"Darcy is a real champion," said Chip. "He can punch and he can box and has more speed than any man I ever fought. He told me he would fight at corners when he reached the United States."

The Luckenbach, on which, according to Chip, Darcy stowed away, arrived at Taitai, Chile, November 29.

Jones to Demand \$75,000. CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Tom Jones tonight said that he would demand \$75,000, with the privilege of 40 per cent of the gross receipts for Willard. He expected to talk over the proposed fight with Rickard in a few days.

MORO HUNTERS TO SEEK GAME December 15 Set for Annual Trip to Wilds for Predatory Beasts.

MORO, Or., Dec. 5.—(Special)—The annual hunting contest among members of the Moro Rod and Gun Club has been set for Friday, December 15. The club has enough members to give each side 35. Captains are W. T. McCoy and William Johnson. At former hunts the game had to be killed in Sherman County. This year there are no restrictions except the game must be killed the day of the hunt and delivered at club headquarters not later than 5 o'clock that night.

Chance Says He Gave Terms at Chicago's Request.

Friendship for Tinker Would Keep Angel Pilot From Trying to Take It From Him, He Says.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 5.—(Special)—Annoyed by conflicting stories regarding his management of the Cubs in 1917, Frank Chance today issued a statement saying: "I have been requested to submit my terms to the directors of the Chicago Cubs and I have done so. They are considering them now.

"I would like to have the impression that I am seeking the job corrected. Joe Tinker, present manager of the club, is a warm personal friend of mine and I would not think of accepting the position if Tinker has the slightest chance of keeping it.

"My only reason in considering a 'come-back' is that I would like to end my baseball career where I started. I had to leave Chicago because I was a sick man, broken in health after the strain of many years. I weigh 195 pounds now and haven't had a sick day since I left the city.

"I would like to emphasize the fact that I only want to go back to Chicago just as an owner's manager. I want to come. I will not be disappointed if they refuse to accept my terms."
