

6 SHORTHORNS AT AUCTION ARE SOLD

Top Price Is \$1350 for Yearling Bull Bought by Davis, Cal., Visitor at Show.

COW SELLS FOR \$1320

Average Price for Herd Is \$411, but Record Is Established by Sale of Diamond's Gladys--Auction Is Considered Best Yet.

BANKERS' DAY. Today's Programme. 10 A. M.—Combination sale of 100 head of Holstein cattle. The sale will continue all day.

The most successful Shorthorn sale ever held in the West, according to those who witnessed it, was brought to a close late yesterday after 67 head had been sold.

The average price paid for the entire herd was \$411; for the cows \$298 and for the bulls \$425.

The highest price ever paid locally for a cow at auction was given by W. J. Townley, of Union, Or. He bought Diamond's Gladys, a 2-year-old, from Frank Brown for \$1320.

The highest-price animal of yesterday's sale was a yearling bull, sold by Mr. Brown to T. S. Glida, of Davis, Cal., for \$1350. The name of the animal is Count Amaranth and was a splendidly reared animal, guaranteed in every particular.

Prime Prince Brings \$1250. The next highest bull was Prime Prince, owned and bred by E. Ogden & Son, of Maryville, Mo. It was purchased by H. J. Teyt, of Perrydale, Or., for \$1250.

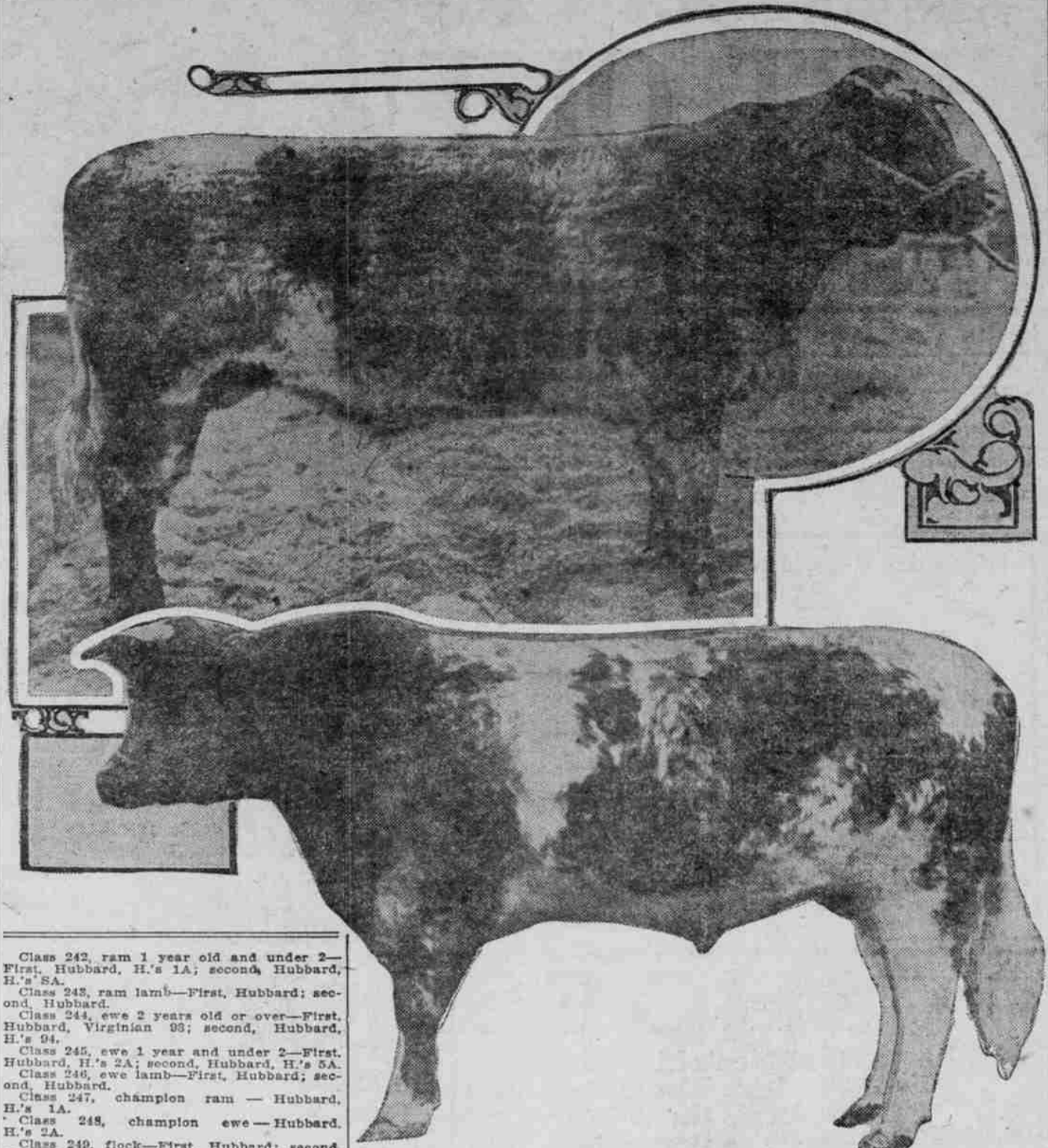
