

GOVERNOR ATTACKS PROJECT METHODS

Central Oregon Company Is Declared to Blame for Storm From Settlers.

10 YEARS MORE IS ASKED

State Would Have Congress Grant Extension for Completion of the Work—Error Made in Time in Resolution Adopted.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—Management of the Central Oregon Irrigation Company was sharply criticized by Governor Withycombe this morning at a Desert Land Board meeting.

Extension Not Protested.

The Desert Land Board had set today as a time for settlers to appear and make any protests they saw fit against recommending the granting of the extension, a telegram having been received at a previous meeting of the Board from the secretary of the Water Users against entering into any new contract with the Central Oregon Irrigation Company.

Extension Not Protested.

One also was received from water users saying that they had no objection to a "judicious" agreement on the part of the Board, suggesting that the plans were under way for forming an irrigation district and asking that no steps be taken to separate such possible districts. The message also contained advice that a letter was following, but the letter was not received up to the time of the Board meeting.

Governor Scores Company.

After the board had voted unanimously to grant the recommendation desired, Governor Withycombe entered a protest against the manner in which the project had been managed and offered the advice that as soon as possible a district be formed to be composed of the settlers.

He declared that after receiving a report from the Public Service Commission he is satisfied that the company has been culpable, that much of the adverse sentiment existing on the part of the settlers is warranted, and he considered the management reprehensible.

He asserted that he had found Roscoe Howard, manager, had had from \$200,000 to \$300,000, which he approved; that Mr. Howard had received commissions from land sales and also that he was a member of the Howard Company that participated in the construction of the project.

Agent Defends Concerns.

Thus, he said, Mr. Howard caught the company in three ways, and he declared that its own activities had brought upon it the present storm.

"I feel the time has come," he said, "when steps should be taken to form the project into an irrigation district on a legitimate basis."

Jeane Stearns, representative of the company, declared it had been doing the best it could and that it was in better condition than any other project in the state.

He thought that figures show other projects have paid about 25 per cent for cost of time, while this project has paid only 15, and said that the money does not come from the maintenance, but that the company has placed more money in the project than it has taken out.

He asserted that the company so far had expended more than \$1,500,000 on the work.

CHEESE FACTORY PLANNED

Farmers Meet at Estacada to Form Co-operative Enterprise.

ESTACADA, Or., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—Estacada will have a co-operative cheese factory, each of two scores or more farmers in business within a radius of 25 miles taking one share each in the enterprise. This decision was reached at a meeting this week

when 54 farmers and merchants of Estacada gathered to discuss the proposed plant.

There are 825 milk cows in this vicinity, all of which are owned by those interested in making a cheese factory a successful project. Another meeting will be held Monday to make final arrangements for permanent organization.

MRS. W. J. HOWLETT BURIED

Prominent Estacada Pioneer's Funeral Held With Grange in Charge.

ESTACADA, Or., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—Estacada today laid to final rest one of the most prominent of her pioneers when Mrs. William J. Howlett was buried in the cemetery at Eagle Creek. She was 75 years old and was one of the early travelers from the East who arrived in Oregon territory in 1852.

Miss Sagina F. Markwood was born in Athens County, Ohio, in 1840, and was married to W. J. Howlett in 1854. The couple moved to a farm near Eagle Creek, and the home had been made there since. The Grange had charge of the funeral, the Rev. Mr. Aase officiating. Mrs. Howlett was a member of the Advent Christian Church.

PRESIDENT VISITS SENATOR

Mr. Wilson Calls on Member of Congress Who, He Hears, Is Ill.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—President Wilson went to visit Senator Williams, of Mississippi, at the latter's home today because he knew the Senator had some Mississippi affairs to talk about and understood he was ill. WORK ON RIVER IS ASKED

Representative Hawley Asks Before Board of Engineers.

J. M. MURPHY DIES

Pioneer Journalist Attended First Public School Here.

END COMES AT OLYMPIA

Connection With Various Northwest Publications Dates Back 52 Years—Public Offices Held in Washington.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 20.—John Miller Murphy, founder and for 52 years editor of the Olympia Weekly Standard, died here today, aged 77 years. He crossed the plains from Indiana to Portland, Or., in 1850, and in 1860 established the Chronicle at Vancouver, Wash. The same year he founded the Olympia Standard, a Democratic paper supporting Lincoln.

In 1910, the 50th anniversary of Murphy's entry into newspaper business was celebrated by the newspapermen of Washington, who gave a loving cup to Murphy.

Mr. Murphy was born near Fort Wayne, Ind., November 3, 1833. On the death of his mother, in 1846, he went to live with a sister, Mrs. Sarah Barnes, and came with her family across the plains to Portland at the age of 11. In 1850, the Barnes family moved to Olympia in 1852, but Murphy was sent to Portland to attend the first public school opened there.

In 1855 he went to work in the composing-room of the Oregon Weekly Times, and two years ago became foreman of the Democratic Standard. He later worked on the Argus, at Oregon City.

Although a Democrat, he supported Lincoln throughout the Civil War, as a result of which he was once challenged to a duel by a Federal officer. Lincoln removed from territorial duty. Mr. Murphy responded with an editorial that demolished the challenger as completely as though he had used a rifle. It was understood that as a public official Mr. Murphy served as State Printer in 1863, and was Territorial Auditor for three terms preceding statehood. He was a member of the Olympia City Council, County Superintendent of School one term and city manager. In 1890 he was editor of the Olympia Theater. The newspaper he founded is still published in Olympia.

Mr. Murphy was married to Eliza A. McGuire, of Portland, in 1867. Mr. and Mrs. Murphy had three children: Frank Murphy, Olympia, and Charles B. Murphy, Tacoma, are the survivors of the late Mr. and Mrs. Murphy. Mr. Murphy died in 1895 and Mrs. Murphy married Susan Sprague, who survives him.

As a newspaper man Mr. Murphy was noted for vigor of editorial expression. Funeral services have not yet been announced.
