CONDUCTOR HELD AT FAULT

Street Railway Superintendent Says Man's Own Report Shows He Was Aggressor in Fight Over Peanut Shells.

Scattering of peanut shells on the floor of a Mount Scott car last week led to fistfights between a passenger and conductor, the "firing" of the car man, his arrest for assault and battery, and a protest yesterday by his mates on the Mount Scott line against his discharge by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company.

They were assured that their rights would be upheld by the company, but the demand regarding Kiekenapp was refused.

"The days of settling disputes with passengers by means of a coupling pin or fist have passed," Superintendent Cooper said. "The passenger in this case was not a rowdy, and he was not treated with the courtesy we require of our employees."

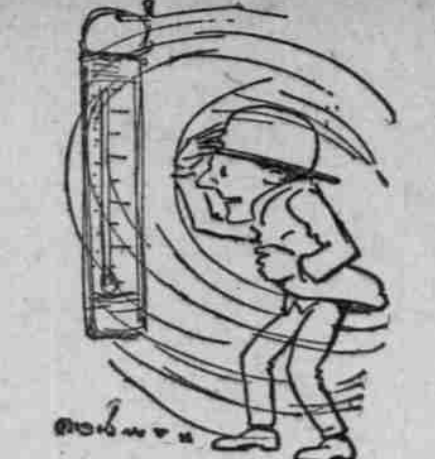
