FESTIVAL TAX PROPOSED

BILL MAY BE INTRODUCED TO RAISE FUNDS FOR EVENT. Levy of One-Fifteenth of a Mill in Counties of More Than 200,000 Devised to Get \$45,000

A measure designed to provide for the support of the Rose Festival by Multnomah County, and is expected to pass without opposition. It would produce about \$45,000 for the Festival on present assessed valuations, and would assure the increase of the fund in correspondence with the increase in values in the county, which would call for a more pretentious celebration each year.

While the status of the 1917 Rose Festival is uncertain, it is under consideration by the Chamber of Commerce to start a plan for the consolidation of the celebration with the entertainment of the National Education Association convention, which will be held in July. The Chamber may defer action on this plan until the Legislature acts on the proposed taxation bill for the Festival.

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MRS. TOM LONG SOUGHT

BLIND CIGAR DEALER REPORTED TO HAVE WIFE AND DAUGHTER. City Hall Attaches Miss Familiar Figure, and Little Stand, Tended for Seven Years, Is Closed.

Although it had been generally understood at the City Hall that Tom Long, the blind cigar dealer who died Monday night, had no relatives, it developed yesterday that he has a wife and daughter somewhere in the West from whom he had been parted for 15 or 20 years. City Attorney LaRoche, at the request of Mayor Alder, yesterday started a search for the missing relatives to notify them of the death.

It was reported that the wife and daughter are in Los Angeles but Mr. LaRoche has received no reply to inquiries. Pending word no funeral arrangements have been made.

Dr. E. H. Danmash was appointed by the Circuit Court yesterday as administrator of the estate. It is generally understood that Mr. Long's effects were far in excess of his debts. The little cigar stand over which he has presided at the City Hall for seven years was closed yesterday and City Hall attaches missed the familiar figure so long seen in the building.

RAILWAY COUNSEL IN CITY Peter Dunne, of Southern Pacific, Confers With Mr. Reames. Peter Dunne, chief counsel for the Southern Pacific Company, passed yesterday in Portland. He came here from San Francisco to attend to a number of legal matters, and yesterday noon he lunched with United States Attorney Reames.

One of the incidental matters attended to by Mr. Dunne was a conference with Mr. Reames over the trial of the alleged cement defendants. Mr. Dunne is the counsel for the San Francisco concerns who have been made defendants in a criminal case, the date of the trial of which has not yet been set.
