While the measure is not yet complete, it is certain that it will carry no search and selzure provision. Dr. Anderson and other "dry" leaders on the ground declare that it merely will carry into effect the wishes of the people, as expressed by the constitutional amendment adopted last November.

The bill will carry an emergency clause, however. That will make it operative immediately after it passes the two houses and is signed by the Governor. Inasmuch as the alcoholic traffic committee of the two houses propose to hold joint sessions before

traffic committee of the two houses propose to hold joint sessions before placing it on third reading in either house, the bill is not likely to encounter serious delays. According to the schedule now mapped out for it, the measure should get through both houses inside of three weeks.

Shipments to Be Barred.

It is probable that the same bill will carry with it amendments to the existing law, regulating the sale of alcohol. Representative Matthieu, who is a member of the House committee on alcoholic traffic, has sent to Portland for copies of the ordinance proposed for restricting alcohol sales there. He is a druggist, and wants the law so arranged that alcohol cannot be sold, excepting for legitimate purposes and for external use only.

It is reported here that some of the radical "dry" forces in Portland want to attach a search and selsure section to the bone-dry measure, but the more conservative element, including Dr. Anderson, Senator Shanks, Senator Eddy and others, are opposed to such stringent measures.

An informal canvass of the two houses reveals that the emergency clause will carry easily.

COMPROMISE BILL IS FRAMED

Bill Would Guard Against Dependency in Declining Years.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 10, ► (Special.)—Senator Olson introduced a hill today providing for state annuities. The hill was drafted by O. D. Teal, of Echo, who last session obtained the passage of a somewhat simflar bill through the House.

This measure provides, briefly, for old age annuities, or pensions, paid for by the beneficiary. These annuities will be provided at a profit to the state.

The object of the bill is stated to be to encourage thrift, to provide against dependent old age and provide funds for the state to lend out on mortgages and purchasing of irrigation bonds.
