Chemical Analysis Is Made to Determine Cause of Sudden Demise, After Autopsy Fails to Solve Mystery.

The sudden death of Peter Achimovich 23 years old, an Austrian laborer, caused the arrest yesterday, on an investigation charge of Frank Leo, a Chinese acting-manager of the Wo Chinese Medicine Company, of 162 1/2 First street.

Chinese Prescribes Pills. With an interpreter, Achimovich sought the Chinese dispensary and told of his ailment. Frank Leo, who is in charge of the business during the absence of his uncle, C. Leo Geo Wo, in China, prescribed a quantity of small brown pills.

Leo officers to take pills. Leo was arrested at 10 o'clock yesterday morning in the offices of the Chinese Medicine Company, by City Detectives John Moloney and Tichenor, and taken to Detective Headquarters, where he was questioned by Deputy District-Attorney Delch and Detective Captain Baly.
