Auto Bought by Captain R. J. Williams From Ray D. Gould Leads to Suspicion of Theft of Machine.

This car bore a Washington factory registration number and an Oregon license, which had been applied for to go with a different engine number, Captain Williams found when he sent to Salem for a 1917 number. The engine number was 125028 and that engine number 125028 should have borne license number 1511. They were switched in the sale of the car.

TRAINING CLASS CONTINUES

Colonel McAlexander to Keep Up Work Until Time for Camp.

The class of 100 citizens in military training that has been drilling at the Army on Friday nights under the instruction of Colonel G. McAlexander will continue until the time for the departure to the citizens' training camp at American Lake next summer. There is no age limit for applicants and no physical examination to be passed, but the class is planned for the preparation of men or the holding of commissions in the Reserve Corps. The class is open to all who desire to attend.

sifted through coarse strainer, five cups of chopped apple, one-fourth teaspoonful salt, one-half cup boiling water, one-half teaspoonful cinnamon, four teaspoonfuls butter.

Method.—Wash, pare, core and dice apples. Arrange crumbs and apples in alternate layers in a buttered baking dish, with buttered crumbs on top. Sprinkle each layer of apples with sugar, salt and spice, moisten it with water, and dot with butter. Cover pudding and bake one hour in slow oven. Remove cover and let crumbs brown. Serve with lemon sauce. Other fruits may be similarly used.

WIRING WARNING GIVEN

Use of Other Devices Instead of Fuses is Declared Dangerous.

Warning has been issued by City Electrical Inspector Dunlap against the use of devices other than regular fuses for connecting up electricity in houses through the fuse box. He says many instances have been found where regular fuses have been replaced with copper wires, pennies or other things which make the electric connection, but leave the electric current unprotected by fuses.
