This was the declaration of John L. Clymer, of San Francisco, director of the Pacific Division of the American Red Cross Society, who spoke at the banquet at the University Club Saturday night celebrating the founding of the Portland chapter of the Red Cross.

Mr. Clymer said that in case war was declared and the need arose, the American Red Cross could mobilize today a force of 25 base hospitals manned by 7690 nurses and a sufficient body of surgeons.
