Dr. C. B. Waller Addresses Association Gathering—Work of Y. M. C. A. Is Indorsed.

WILSON'S REPLY IS READ

"There is Now No Mason and Dixon's Line—We are One People and Germany Soon Will Know It," Is Sense of Gathering.

There is now no Mason and Dixon's line, we are one people and Germany soon will know it, declared Dr. Calvin B. Waller in his address yesterday before the Portland Ministerial Association.

In response to the telegram sent March 31 and expressing the wish that he be given power in the existing crisis, the Ministerial Association received a message thanking them cordially for their good will.

President Wilson's telegram was read during the business session. An immense American flag formed a background for the reading officer, Dr. R. E. Smith and the speaker.

The Ministerial Association indorsed the work of the Y. M. C. A. and adopted a resolution that in event of war, denominational religious movement be carried on through the Y. M. C. A. and not through separate denominations.

In his address Dr. Waller said that the social, educational, moral and industrial development of the South in the last few years has been rapid and substantial.

Ministers Discuss Address. The address was discussed by several ministers who formerly resided in the South.

Dr. J. D. Springston, formerly of Virginia, spoke in behalf of the bonds of patriotism and loyalty that exist between his present and former home states.

Captain John Anderson made a plea for donations of magazines and books for the men and families in the 460 logging camps of Oregon and Washington.

PENDLETON PIONEER AND INDIAN WAR VETERAN SUCCEUMBS.

FIVE CHILDREN SURVIVE MEMBER OF PROMINENT OREGON FAMILY—TWO BROTHERS AT DEATH BED.

PENDLETON, Or., April 2.—(Special.)—Carroll J. Matlock, pioneer Pendleton man and member of a prominent Oregon family, died here today at the age of 80.

IN 1856 he served as wagon master during the Rogue River Indian War. He lived in Eugene until 1871, when he came to Umatilla County. In the early days he owned a racing stable, which later became famous. He was a pioneer in the motion-picture business in Pendleton.
