

ALIEN ENEMIES TO BE RESTRAINED

Possession of Arms or Material for Espionage Forbidden by Proclamation.

VERBAL ATTACKS CURBED

Places of Residence to Be Regulated—None Obeying Laws Will Be Disturbed—Wilson Asks Citizens to Be Kind.

SIGNING OF WAR RESOLUTION WIG-WAGGED TO WORLD.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—When President Wilson signed the war resolution today Lieutenant Byron McCandless, aide to Secretary Daniels, wig-wagged a message from a White House window to the Navy Department and telegraphers there passed it on to the great wireless towers at Arlington for instant broadcasting to all naval vessels and stations.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Immediately after signing the joint resolution adopted by Congress, declaring a state of war exists between the United States and Germany, President Wilson issued a war proclamation, as follows:

Whereas, the Congress of the United States, in the exercise of the constitutional authority vested in them, have resolved by joint resolution of the Senate and House of Representatives bearing date this day, that a state of war between the United States and the Imperial German Government, which has been thrust upon the United States, is hereby formally declared;

Whereas, it is provided by section 4067 of the revised statutes that:

"Whenever there is declared a war between the United States and any foreign nation or government or any invasion or predatory incursion is perpetrated, attempted or threatened against the territory of the United States, by any foreign nation or government, and the President makes public proclamation of the event, all nations, persons, denizens or subjects of a hostile nation or government being made of the age of 14 years and upwards who shall be within the United States and not actually naturalized, shall be liable to be apprehended, restrained, secured and removed as alien enemies."

Powers Held by President.

"The President is authorized in any such event, by his proclamation, to direct the conduct to be observed on the part of the United States toward the alien who becomes so liable; the manner and degree of the restraint to which they shall be subjected; the removal of them from their place of residence, and upon what security their residence shall be permitted, and to provide for the removal of those who, not being permitted to reside within the United States, refuse or neglect to depart therefrom; and to establish any such regulations which are found necessary in the premises and for the public safety."

Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim, to all whom it may concern, that a state of war exists between the United States and the Imperial German Government, and I do specially direct all officers, civil or military, of the United States, that they exercise vigilance and seal in the discharge of the duties incident to such state of war, and I do, moreover, earnestly appeal to all American citizens that they in their devotion to their country, dedicated from its foundation to the principles of liberty and justice, uphold the laws of the land and give undivided and willing support to those measures which may be adopted by the constitutional authorities in pursuance of the war to a successful issue and in obtaining a secure and just peace.

Conduct Is Prescribed.

And, acting by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the United States and the said sections of the revised statutes, I hereby further proclaim and direct that the conduct to be observed on the part of the United States toward the alien who becomes so liable, and so long as they shall conduct themselves in accordance with law they shall be untroubled in the enjoyment of their lives and occupations and be accorded the consideration due to all peaceful and law-abiding persons, except so far as restriction may be necessary for their own protection and for the safety of the United States, and towards such alien enemies who conduct themselves in accordance with law, all citizens of the United States are enjoined to preserve the peace and to treat them with all such friendliness as may be compatible with loyalty and allegiance to the United States.

And all alien enemies who fail to conduct themselves as so enjoined, in addition to all other penalties prescribed by law, shall be liable to restraint or to removal or to removal and depart from the United States in the manner prescribed by sections 4068 and 4070 of the revised statutes and as prescribed in the regulations duly promulgated by the President.

Arms Forbidden to Alien Enemies.

And pursuant to the authority vested in me, I hereby declare and establish the following regulations which I deem necessary in the premises and for the public safety:

1. An alien enemy shall not have in his possession at any time or place, arms, weapons or implements of war, or component parts thereof, ammunition, explosives or other military or naval material used in the manufacture of explosives.

2. An alien enemy shall not have in his possession at any time or place or use or operate any aircraft or wireless apparatus or any form of signaling device, or any form of cipher code or any paper, document or book, written or printed in cipher or in which there may be invisible writing.

3. All property found in the possession of an alien enemy in violation of the foregoing resolutions shall be subject to seizure by the United States.

4. An alien enemy shall not approach or be found within one-half of a mile of any Federal or State post, camp, arsenal, aircraft station, Government or naval vessel, Navy-yard, factory or property of any manufacture of munitions of war or any products for the use of the Army or Navy.

5. An alien enemy shall not work for, or publish any attack or threat against the Government or Congress of the United States or either branch thereof, or against the measures or policy of the United States, or against the persons or property of any persons in the military, naval or civil service of the United States or of the states or territories or of the District of Columbia or of the municipal governments thereof.

6. An alien enemy shall not commit or abet any hostile act against the United States or give information, aid or comfort to its enemies.

Residence Is Restricted.

7. An alien enemy shall not reside in or continue to reside in, to remain in or enter any locality which the President may from time to time designate by an executive order as a prohibitive area in which residence by an alien enemy shall be found by him to constitute a danger to the public peace and safety of the United States, or to permit from the President and except under such limitations or restrictions as the President may prescribe.

8. An alien enemy whom the President shall have reasonable cause to believe to be aiding or about to aid the enemy or to be at large to the danger of the public peace or safety of the United States, or to be violated or to be about to violate any of these regulations, shall remove to any local-

tion designated by the President by executive order and shall not remove therefrom without permit, or shall depart from the United States if so required by the President.

10. No alien enemy shall land in or enter the United States except under such regulations as may be prescribed by the President.

11. If necessary to prevent violation of the regulations all alien enemies will be obliged to register.

12. An alien enemy whom there may be reasonable cause to believe to be aiding or about to aid the enemy, or who be at large to the danger of the public peace or safety, or who violates or who attempts to violate or of whom there is reasonable cause to believe that he is about to violate any regulation to be promulgated by the President or any criminal law of the United States, or who is in violation of any thereof, will be subject to summary arrest by the United States Marshal or his deputy or such other officers as the President shall designate, and confinement in such penitentiary, prison, jail, military camp or other place of detention as may be directed by the President.

The proclamation and the regulations herein contained shall extend and apply to all land and water, continental or insular, of the United States within the jurisdiction of the United States.

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3500 AT ALBANY RALLY

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IRON SAVED ON SUPPLIES FOR NAVY

Only One Company Is Forced to Lower Price, \$2,000,000 Being Deducted.

STEEL CUT IS VOLUNTARY

Torpedo-Manufacturing Concern Is Brought to Terms by Invoking Law Authorizing Government to Fix Fair Profit.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—A saving of \$18,000,000 in the Navy's bill for steel during 1917 and of more than \$2,000,000 in a single order for torpedoes was represented in price agreements effected with the manufacturers today by Secretary Daniels.

The schedule of prices for the year's supply of steel, agreed on at a conference between the Secretary and J. A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel Corporation, is the same the Navy paid for its 1916 consignment and considerably below the current market. Details as to the amount or exact prices were not made public.

In the case of torpedo orders, Mr. Daniels brought the manufacturing concern, the E. W. Bliss Company, of Brooklyn, to terms by invoking several days ago for the first time the new law, authorizing the Government to set a reasonable price for Navy material and compel private plants to abide by them.

Agreements Are Voluntary.

Mr. Farrell acted in the steel price negotiations as vice-chairman of the special committee of the American Iron and Steel Institute, recently appointed by the Council of National Defense to facilitate the securing of construction material.

Through voluntary agreements previously effected with copper, brass, munitions, shipbuilding, and other concerns, the department already has secured a considerable amount of material. In today's steel and torpedo agreements.

Except in cases of necessity, Secretary Daniels will not invoke the new law permitting seizure of plants not offering to turn over supplies at a reasonable price. Although officials permitted it to become known several days ago that the Government had exercised its new authority to prevent exorbitant profits, it was not announced until today against what company the action was taken.

Government Fixes Price.

The department first asked, it was said, that the Bliss Company reduce its torpedo bids, and when it found that a reduction of \$300 per torpedo was the best that could be secured by negotiation, Mr. Daniels ordered the ordinance bureau to determine the cost of production and add a reasonable profit, thus fixing a fair price. The bureau fixed a price of \$1575 per torpedo under the original bid submitted, and the Secretary informed the Bliss Company that it would be required to fill orders promptly at the new figures. Today representatives of the company informed the Secretary that they would gladly accept the order on the new basis and speed up manufacture.

Official on Way to Return Impersonator of 'Oliver Osborne' and Suspected Prison Refugee.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Charles H. Wax, detained as a witness in the mysterious Rae Tanzer-Oliver Osborne case, was discharged in the Federal Court here today by Judge John G. Knox, Assistant United States Attorney.

Wax, who claims to be the "Oliver Osborne" who courted Miss Tanzer, was at once arrested on an old charge of larceny for the purpose, the police assert, of detaining him until the arrival from Oregon of official notice, and the way here to obtain his extradition. The police allege Wax escaped from an Oregon prison several years ago.

When giving his pedigree today, Wax stated his occupation is "a gentleman trying to please everybody, especially the authorities."

RUSSIA WILL BE REPUBLIC

Popular Sentiment for Democracy Like United States.

LONDON, April 6.—A group of Americans having large interests in Russia has sent a report to London that the situation is stabilizing itself and that the provisional government of Russia has been strengthened greatly as a result of President Wilson's speech.

Present indications point undoubtedly to the establishment of a republic. The whole sentiment of the Russian people is in favor of a democracy similar to that of the United States. This has produced a great feeling of affection and kinship toward Americans.

292 BESET MARITAL MART

Chicago Rumor of Ban on Marriages During War Causes Rush.

CHICAGO, April 6.—Two hundred and ninety-two marriage licenses were issued today. This unprecedented record was due to a rumor that marriage licenses would not be issued during the war.

Hundreds of telegraphic messages were received asking if this were true. One hundred applicants a day is the average.

ment is being entirely reorganized, and the great mass of routine which has overwhelmed even the highest officials is to be redistributed along new lines. An enormous amount of work is expected in the near future, with various commissions, military, economic and diplomatic, going back and forth between this country and the allies. There will be endless communications on matters of common interest.

Foreign Diplomats Advised.

The first act by the department when war became a fact was to prepare copies of the war resolution and proclamation for all the foreign diplomats in a single order for torpedoes was represented in price agreements effected with the manufacturers today by Secretary Daniels.

Negotiations are now practically completed for the admittance of American armed ships into neutral harbors. All European neutrals are expected to receive them, except possibly Holland.

RADIO TO BE CURBED

GOVERNMENT IS TO SEIZE ALL PRIVATE PLANTS.

Those That Cannot Be of Service to Navy Are to Be Put Out of Commission Immediately.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Seizure of all radio stations in the United States and its possessions, operation of those needed for national communications and closing of others was authorized by President Wilson today.

Enforcement of the order was delegated to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Navy Department, and already steps toward carrying it out already are in progress. It is understood that all plants for which no place can be found in the Navy's wireless system, including amateur apparatus for which close search will be made, are to be put out of commission immediately.
