

PRESS CENSORSHIP SECTION MODIFIED

Senate Adopts Amendment to Prohibit Limit on Comment or Criticism.

FURTHER DEBATE LIKELY

Several Attempts Made to Strike Out Drastic Features Which Opponents Say Greatly Endanger Free Discussion.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Another day of lively discussion in the Senate of the espionage bill with interest centered on press censorship cleared the way for disposal of the principal espionage and censorship features tomorrow.

Leaders are endeavoring to hasten the final vote on the entire bill so that the Administration may increase measure with draft feature may be given the right of way.

Several Senators today offered amendments to the espionage clause to make less drastic its restrictions on individual citizens and the press. Senators Borah, Johnson of California, and others were vigorously attacked this feature, asserting it strikes seriously at rights of free speech and a free press.

Amendment Is Adopted. Just at adjournment tonight the Senate adopted a committee amendment to the censorship clause prohibiting any regulation limiting discussion, comment or criticism of the acts and policies of the Government or its representatives.

The press censorship section of the bill provides 10 years' imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000 for persons who collect, publish or elicit information concerning matters of National defense which might be of use to the enemy.

Senator Borah contended that Congress was devoid of power to interfere in any way with the liberty of the press. He also declared the framers of the Constitution were agreed that the National Government should be excluded absolutely from all power over the press.

Others Oppose Section. Regarding the contention that National safety makes a censorship necessary now, Senator Borah said: "The public interest has always been the basis for all attacks upon the press."

Senator Johnson, of Colorado, proposed to strike out virtually the entire so-called "censorship" section, but action was deferred.

Senator Johnson, of California, opposed the whole section as a "free speech" as well as a "free press." "My opinion is not so much because of tenderness for the press," said he.

Further Powers Forecast. "We have already conferred almost autocratic power financially. We will probably confer extensive other powers on the President."

House Committee Agrees. The House Judiciary committee agreed tonight on a draft of an espionage bill similar to those before the Senate.

Limitations on the publication of information regarding National defense is defined, with the penalty for violation "a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for a period not to exceed ten years, or both fine and imprisonment."

German Strikers Dictate Their Own Terms.

UNTRUE REPORTS ISSUED

Inaccuracy Shown by Publication in Vorwarts of Fact That 300 Munitions Plants Closed After Semi-Official Denial.

COPENHAGEN, April 17, via London, April 19.—The latest German newspapers to arrive here, including the socialist organs, confirm the semi-official announcement that the Berlin strike has ended.

Among the concessions made by the government are compliance with the demands of the union for the establishment of a standing commission of labor representatives which will have a voice in the food distribution in Greater Berlin.

Incidentally the German papers throw an interesting light upon the inaccuracy of semi-official reports. A censored account which was telegraphed abroad declared, for instance, the munition industry had not been affected.
