SUNSHINE REVIVES BOATING. Launches and Rowboats Out Sunday in Spite of Wind.

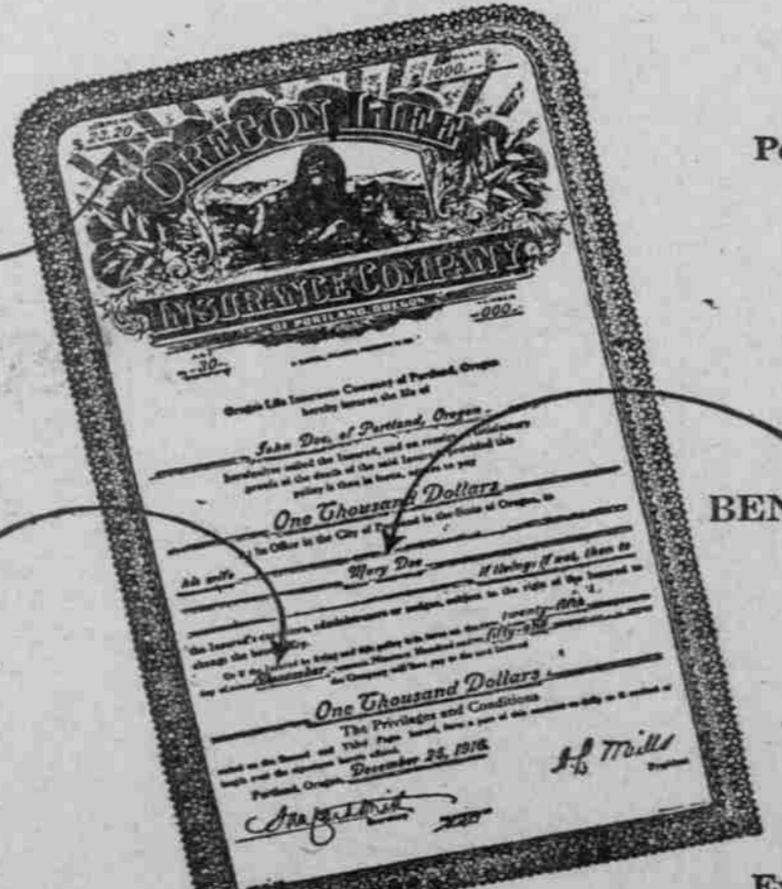
As a result of the good weather, launching and boating parties were the order of the day yesterday and a large number of pleasure craft were out cutting the river.
