"We are losing a good deal of time in the school work because of the fact that contagious diseases get a foothold and cause us to close our classes for a few days at a time," said Superintendent Alderman, in suggesting the need of more inspectors to the board.

Director Drake said he had just approved bills for fumigation during the past month that amounted to \$325 for materials alone. It was asserted three times as much medical inspection as is afforded is required here, and the subject of issuing health certificates to children who recover from illness and return to school was also deemed unsatisfactory.


